THE POSITION OF HARTLAND TOWN

(Intended for last issue)

Hartland, N. B., Feb. 5, 1924

In today's issue of the Woodstock Press, over the name of Carleton there appears a satire upon the Town of Hartland in respect to her relation to the County in the matter of meet ing her obligations. In the same issue in a letter addressed to the Editor, the County, outside of the Shire Town comes in for considerable criticism along the same line, in this case an endeavor is made to show that the Town of Woodstock is bearing an un equal proportion of the burden of the rest of the County. While it may ap pear on the surface to both of these writers that the burden of taxation is not properly distributed, it might be well to give some facts to make their

proposition clear to the public. The Town of Hartland has neve failed to meet her obligations, neither does she wish to impose any improper burden on the rest of the county.

It is a well known fact that the peo ple of Hartland have paid for what they have and have had no presents from any Government or any citizen They are paying their way and to date there is only a bonded debt of \$9,000 on the Town itself, the school district being bonded for \$60,000 to cover serial bond issue for payment of one of the finest and most complete structures of its kind in the Province While we have not been as fortunate as our sister Town who has been bequeathed two seats of learning, nev ertheless, we do not complain on account of this fact.

tain percentage of the budget in order to meet liabilities due to delinquents etc. The Town of Hartland protested to the County Council in the form of two resolutions, endeavoring to nut the whole County on the same foot ing or else give them the benefit of a cash trade.

As the Town of Woodstock pays one seventh into the County Treasury, and is in a far better position to receive benefits in the way of the County grants to institutions located there, the burden falls less heavy upon the citizens of Woodstock than it does upon other parts of the County, the Town of Hartland included.

Further, the value of the Town of Woodstock compared with the County is two ninths, while she only pays one seventh of the budget as already pointed out. At the last meeting of the County Council a resolution was passed which raised the percentage from ten to twenty-five to cover delinquents for the year 1923. Now it does not appear to be a fair proposition to the Town of Hartland to pay cash for its taxes and then have to bear a portion of the interest account of overdraft on the County as well as delinquent taxes reassessed. It is the same principle as a man paying cash at a store and then having 25 per cent added to his bill on account of the bad
