### THE POSITION OF HARTLAND TOWN

(Intended for last issue)

Hartland, N. B., Feb. 5, 1924.

"Observer":

In today's issue of the Woodstock Press, over the name of Carleton, there appears a satire upon the Town of Hartland in respect to her relation to the County in the matter of meeting her obligations. In the same issue in a letter addressed to the Editor, the County, outside of the Shire Town comes in for considerable criticism along the same line, in this case an endeavor is made to show that the Town of Woodstock is bearing an unequal proportion of the burden of the rest of the County. While it may appear on the surface to both of these writers that the burden of taxation is not properly distributed, it might be well to give some facts to make their proposition clear to the public.

The Town of Hartland has never failed to meet her obligations, neither does she wish to impose any improper burden on the rest of the County.

It is a well known fact that the people of Hartland have paid for what they have and have had no presents from any Government or any citizen.

They are paying their way and to date there is only a bonded debt of \$9,000 on the Town itself, the school district being bonded for \$60,000 to cover serial bond issue for payment of one of the finest and most complete structures of its kind in the Province. While we have not been as fortunate as our sister Town who has been blessed with two seats of learning, nevertheless, we do not complain on account of this fact.

It has been the custom of the County Council for a number of years to charge back upon the County a cer-

tain percentage of the budget in order to meet liabilities due to delinquents, etc. The Town of Hartland protested to the County Council in the form of two resolutions, endeavoring to put the whole County on the same footing or else give them the benefit of a cash trade.

As the Town of Woodstock pays one seventh into the County Treasury, and is in a far better position to receive benefits in the way of the County grants to institutions located there, the burden falls less heavy upon the citizens of Woodstock than it does upon other parts of the County, the Town of Hartland declared.

Further, the value of the Town of Woodstock compared with the County is two ninths, while she only pays one seventh of the budget as already pointed out. At the last meeting of the County Council a resolution was passed which raised the percentage from ten to twenty-five to cover delinquents for the year 1923. Now it does not appear to be a fair proposition to the Town of Hartland to pay cash for its taxes and then have to bear a portion of the interest account of overdraft on the County as well as delinquent taxes reassessed. It is the same principle as a man paying cash at a store and then having 25 per cent added to his bill on account of the bad

debts of his neighbor. The Town of Hartland is asking for, and justly so, for a cash settlement basis exclusive of arrears and interest from the rest of the County.

In view of the foregoing facts it should be understood that Hartland pays for every dollar she receives benefit for and when it comes to vocational school, while we have sent a large number of young folks away to other seats of learning, it can only be found that two have gone to the above school, while we hope many more may avail themselves of the splendid opportunity.

### Notice of Legislation

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT application will be made to the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick at the next session thereof for the passing of an Act incorporating for the purpose of acquiring and distributing electrical power and energy, under the name of "The Bath, Bristol and Florenceville Hydro Electric District," that part of the Parishes of Kent, Peel, Simonds and Wicklow in the County of Carleton, described as follows:

Beginning on the eastern bank of the Saint John River at a point directly opposite the northwest corner of the Buckwheat Bridge, so called; thence easterly crossing the main highway road and the Canadian Pacific Railway to the Oakland Road; and following the said Oakland Road to a point 100 rods from the said main highway road; thence northerly, maintaining the same distance from said main highway road, through the villages of East-Florenceville, Bristol and Bath, to the northern boundary of land occupied by Howard Gibson line to the eastern line of land owned by James Howlett; thence southerly along said line of said Howlett land to the north line of land owned by Alfred Gibson; thence westerly along said line of said Gibson's land to the Saint John River; thence south along the eastern bank of said river to the northern side line of land known as the McMullin farm, now occupied by Harry Smith; thence westerly across the said river to a point where the northern side of the Greenfield Road intersects the western side of the main highway road leading from Florenceville to Andover; thence westerly following said side of said Greenfield Road to a point 500 feet distant from the said main highway road; thence southerly, maintaining the same distance from the said main highway road to the southern side line of land owned by Hedley Jewett; thence easterly following said line of said Jewett land to the Saint John River, and continuing in the same course across said river; and thence southerly along the east bank of said river to the place of beginning.
