**NEW AMUSEMENT TAX
BARS OUT DEAD HEADS**

Beginning October 1, with the en-
forcement of the amusement tax,
"dead-head" in the local theatres will
be a thing of the past, according to
the provisions of the Act, the regu-
lations for which have been approved
by the Minister of Finance. Hon.
John Hart, after a lengthy confer-
ence with Mr. Gordon chief censor
of the moving pictures.

The feature of the act which does
away with "dead-heads" leaves no
latitude for the exercise of discre-
tion on the part of the proprietor, as
it prohibits him from allowing any
person, other than the bona-fide em-
ployees, to enter his place of amuse-
ment for the purpose of witnessing
a performance unless a tax is first
paid. This, it is believed, will apply
to members of the police force and
other uniformed officials, to say noth-
ing of representatives of the press,
and many others who have been wont
in the past, to stroll past the door-
keeper without passing in a ticket,
by virtue of their friendliness with
the management or in exchange for
advertising space.

It is understood that the plan
adopted calls for two series of tickets
one the regular admittance ticket,
the other the ticket representing the
tax. A patron of a theatre or other
performance which comes under the
operation of the Act will have to pay
for two tickets at the box office.
Separate receptacles will be placed
at the entrance, into one of which
will be deposited the house ticket,
and into the other the tax ticket.
The treasury Department will sup-
ply the tax tickets to the proprietor
of the amusement house in quanti-
ties of not less than \$20 in aggregate
value, and a discount will be allowed
to the amusement place proprietor,
varying from ten per cent on the
price of the low-priced admittance to
three per cent on those which apply
to the high-priced tickets. This dis-
count will, it is believed, reimburse
the proprietors for the extra trouble
in making the collection of the tax.
The proprietors will be called upon

to make a weekly report to the cen-
sor, under whose supervision the en-
forcement of the Act falls, showing
the daily attendance, the respective
number of admittance tickets issued
and taken in, and other details, to
permit of a regular checking up by
the censor of the business of the
house.

**McGraw is Fined
THOUSAND DOLLARS**

New York Aug. 30.—John J.
McGraw manager of the New York
National Baseball Club, was today
fined \$1000 and censured and reprimanded by the board of directors of
the National League for approving
an interview, subsequently published
containing an attack upon John K.
Tener, president of the league.

This action was taken as the re-
sult of the demand for an investiga-
tion of the case by the New York
Chapter of the Baseball Writers' As-
sociation of America, after Mc-
Graw had signed a statement repudi-
ating the interview when brought
before the league on charges filed by
President Tener.

C. P. R. EARNINGS

Montreal, Aug. 30.—Despite a set-
back in net earnings in July, Cana-
dian Pacific Railway gross receipts
and net profits for the current year
to date continue the largest ever re-
ported by the company.

Gross earnings for the seven
months totalled \$84,735,637, against
the previous high record of \$77-
\$62,570 in 1913.

Net earnings of \$24,575,355 com-
pared with the previous record of
\$23,618,825 in the corresponding
period of 1916.

NOT MET YESTERDAY
Helsingfors, Aug. 30.—Russian
troops occupied the Parliament build-
ings here at an early hour yesterday
to prevent the re-assembling of the
Diet in defiance of the decision of
the Russian government. The city
is calm.

WHEAT FIXED AT TWO-TWENTY BUSHEL

Washington, Aug. 30.—The price
of Number 1 Northern Spring wheat
was fixed at \$2.20 a bushel at Chicago
for the 1917 crop today by the
Wheat Fair Price Committee, head-
ed by H. A. Garfield, whose findings,
reported after three days' delibera-
tions, were submitted to and approved
of by President Wilson.

Labor representatives on the com-
mittee voted first for \$1.84, and the
farmers for \$2.50. After a long dis-
cussion a compromise at \$2.20 was
approved unanimously.

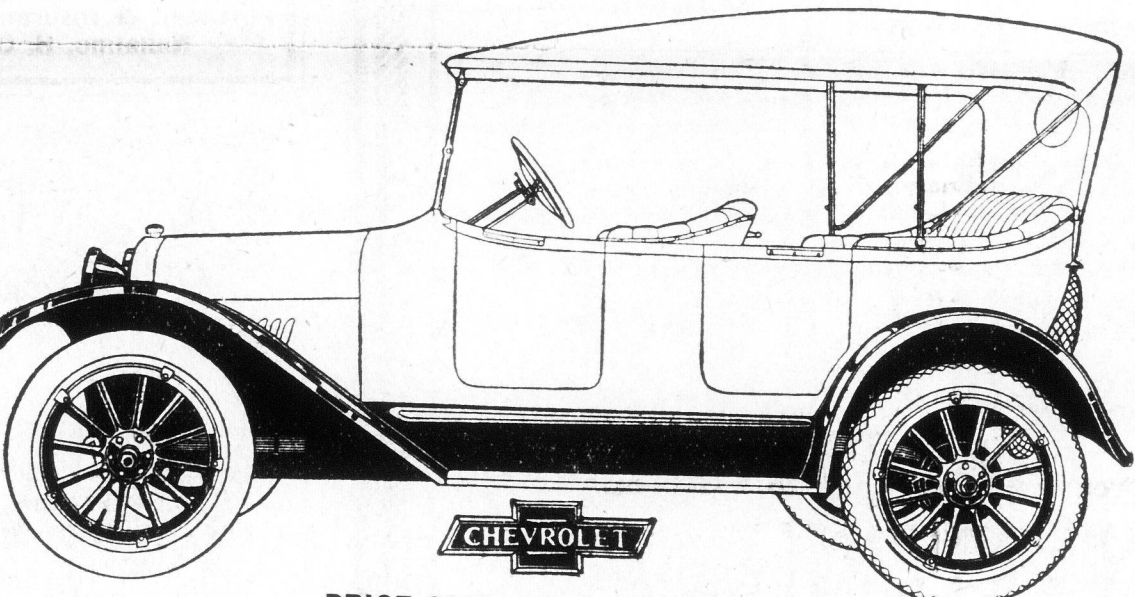
