THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 28.—At noon today the members of the Legislature met at the parliament building and took the oath of allegiance to His Majesty before Judge Gregory and signed the roll. The absentees were Messrs. Phibbs, Robertson and Mr. Leach. St. John, McLean, Carleton, Clasper, Sundry, Judge Gregory also came in. Mr. Ramsford, clerk of the House, and Assistant Clerk, Dillidge, and Sergeant-at-arms Ratter were then sworn in.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon the formal opening took place. The Lieutenant Governor was attended by Col. Dunbar, D.O.C., Lieut. Windsor, A. D. C., Major W. C. Good, Lieut. Col. McLean and R. S. Barker. At the parliament building His Honor was received by a band of music from the Military School under Capt. Thacker, and by the party entered the building the detachment from the Newcastle Field Battery, under Major Maithy fired a salute of fifteen guns.

The galleries were completely filled and a large number of spectators had seats on the floor of the assembly room, which was handsomely draped in black and purple.

Clifford W. Robinson, M. P. P. for Westmorland, was unanimously elected Speaker, on nomination of Premier Tweedie, and the formal proceedings continued, the Governor reading the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:
I welcome you again to the discharge of your legislative duties and am pleased to be able to congratulate you upon the satisfactory progress made by the people of New Brunswick since your last meeting. The general prosperity of the Dominion, which has been shared by this province, is cause for profound thankfulness, and I have every reason to believe that it is likely to be enduring.

It was with the deepest regret that I learned of the passing to our Eternal Rest of our late beloved Sovereign, and I am sure that you and all the people of the province join in the universal sorrow occasioned by this sad event.

As head of a vast empire during more than half of the past century, her beneficent and constitutional rule, as well as her noble example in all relations of life, have made her name respected and revered. The people, through my desire to give an expression of their sympathy with the Royal Family in their great bereavement; while acknowledging with profound confidence the continued fealty and accession to the throne, of His Majesty King Edward VII.

The prompt and effective assistance given by Canada in the South African struggle has shown in a very practical way the loyalty of the people to the British crown and policy and we are glad to notice the fact that the conduct of our own provincial volunteers has been so favorably recognized and appreciated.

The subject of Technical Education involving instruction in agriculture, mining and the mechanical arts in respect to which the Legislature gave a formal resolution to enter into arrangements with the Government of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, but which has not yet been carried into effect, is a subject of great importance to the province. In accordance with the desire which has been shown by the Legislature to encourage the establishment of Cold Storage Warehouses at central points in the province, my government has given the subject very careful consideration, and it is intended to submit for your approval a measure which will ensure the immediate erection at the port of St. John of a large and thoroughly equipped Cold Storage Warehouse, and which, it is also hoped, will lead at an early day to the establishment of a number of smaller warehouses in various sections of the province. It is confidently expected that the establishment of these warehouses for the storage of perishable products of the farm and the sea will prove of material advantage to our people.

The recent scarcity of coal and the great increase in price have directed the attention of my government to the possibility of developing the valuable coal area lying in the counties of Queens and Sunbury; and a measure having been introduced in view of the annual receipts and expenditures of the province be published in the Royal Gazette within sixty days after the close of the fiscal year.

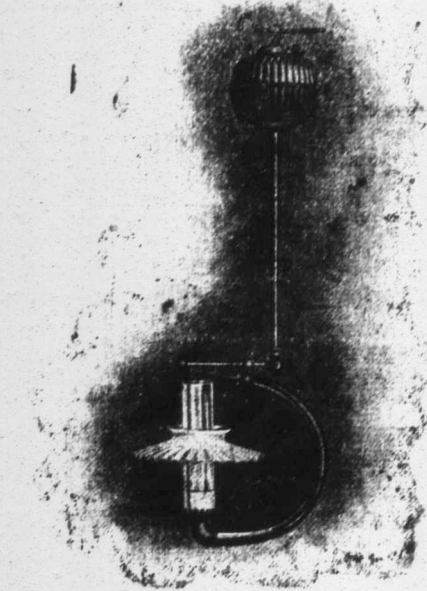
