## Bathurst News.

### Meeting of License Commissioners

The Operetta Ciderella in the Masonic Hall on Friday evening last was well attended and the programme rendered was very satisfactory and pleasing to all. The very unfavorable weather no doubt kept large numbers away, nevertheless the hall was well crowded. We have heard so many gratifying expressions as to the high merits of the entertainers that we feel sorry that being absent from the concert we cannot contribute to your paper a full account of the numbers as rendered in the programme with special mention of the performers.

If we are correctly informed Bathurst is soon to have a larger and more commodious hall for entertainments in the future, as we learn that Mr. John P. Legere has rented a site on Water Street near Miss Meahan's store, and will build either a brick or wooden block shortly which will contain a nice concert hall on a modern plan, also sample rooms and offices.

Messrs. Sumner & Co. shipped six horses to Moncton on Monday, where they were to be sold at auction on Thursday 23rd inst.

The work of decorating the interior of the Village Church was commenced this week by Mr. Bielenberg who has the contract. The work is to be finished in a most skilful and artistic style.

The liquor license Commissioners convened here at the Court House on the 18th inst. for the purpose of dealing with the granting of licenses for the county, the results of which seems to have provoked indignation in certain

quarters. Their actions in granting a license in the Village are at least not very commendable. In this case a strong petition signed by representative men was apparently ignored, however it is said that proper steps have been taken to have their decision revoked.

The Summer Company have purchased the Cain house on the Village corner, and the present tenant will continue keeping private borders, or general employees of the concern.

Mr. Ed. W. Chandler of Campbellton was in town on Monday on his way through to Moncton.

Men are being rushed up river in quick order this week and already favourable news is to hand from Mr. Good's drive on South Branch of Little River which is progressing rapidly. The prospects look bright for safe delivery of the lumber in the woods this spring as lots of snow to make good water when time comes is reported yet in the woods.

A scarcity in eggs and butter to supply the local demand seems much felt here this spring, and prices for either article are holding very firm. We have been informed also that potatoes are being retained in some of the stores at 25c a bucket. This seems hardly creditable as the price seems an extortionate one at the present time.

### Gaspe Short Line Bill Passed

Shore Line to be Built Simultaneously

(Special to EVENTS)

Ottawa, April 21—Railway Committee have passed Gaspe Short Line bill including amendment by Chas. Marcell M. P. As a condition of their charter the Shore Line is to be built simultaneously with the Gaspe line, ten miles each year else the charter will be null for both lines. If the Company buy the Atlantic & Lake Superior Ry. they must pay the debts.

This Bill of the Atlantic Quebec & Western grants them a charter for a Railway from Causapscal to Gaspe and from Causapscal to Edmundston N. B.; also for a line from Paspébiac to Gaspe along the littoral.

It will be remembered that a few days ago, a bill presented to the Quebec Legislature by the same company asking for an extension of time of two years from April 1st 1903 during which the work authorized by the act of two years previous shall be commenced and five years from July 1st 1903 during which it is to be completed, was also passed so that nothing now stands in the way of the commencement of work by the company. Mr. Marcell, alive to the interests of his constituency, has had it stipulated that if the A. & L. S. be purchased the debts must be paid. Our readers will notice that the littoral if built must commence at Paspébiac.

**Atlantic, Quebec & Western Ry.**  
Preliminary Survey Completed

Ottawa, April 2—Mr. Hy. O. Sullivan, the engineer in charge of the survey of the Atlantic, Quebec & Western Ry., has completed the preliminary survey of the Short Line through the interior of the Gaspe Peninsula from Amqui to Gaspe, and reports to have found a good road all through with no heavier grades than one per cent. This proves the absurdity of the pretention of the adversaries of the

project who refused to admit the veracity of the reports of Messrs. Ellis and Lowe of the Geological Department and who wanted the Parliament to refuse the charter because as they pretended, there was no valley there and the road was impossible.
