BUY YOUR WINTER EGGS IN MAY AND JUNE

Eggs laid in April, May and early June keep better than those laid later in the season. If properly treated, they will keep in perfect condition from eight to twelve months. If the eggs are to be boiled the larger end should be pierced with a needle point before putting them in the boiling water.

The eggs to begin with, must be fresh and clean, not washed clean, but laid clean. If the shell of an egg is not clean, use it at once. If there is a spot of soil on the shell, the water glass does not come in contact with the shell and the egg will decay.

A quart of water-ware container, crock or agate-ware container, will suffice for 15 dozen eggs. Clean the crock thoroughly, scald till hot, wipe dry and stand in the sun, if convenient.

Boil 3 quarts of water, allow it to cool thoroughly, then add the water glass and stir well in the crock. Stand the crock in a cool, dry place and do

not move unnecessarily after the eggs are packed. Put the eggs loosely, but carefully, in the solution, leaving a depth of two inches or more over the top layer of eggs. Tie heavy oiled paper over the crock to prevent evaporation. For more than 15 dozen eggs, two crocks are preferable to one larger one. After using the water glass once, it must be thrown away.

If water glass is too expensive or is unobtainable, add 3 pounds of unslacked lime to 5 gallons of water. After the lime has dissolved and settled, carefully dip off the water and pour over the eggs as with water glass. Do not pour the water glass or lime water over the eggs till it has thoroughly cooled.

POTATO CULTIVATION

Be wise in time and if you are cultivating potatoes send to the publications branch, department of agriculture, Ottawa, for Bulletin No. 50. This bulletin, which is a popular edition of a more ambitious work, prepared by the Dominion horticulturist, is calculated to prove an invaluable aid to the potato grower, whether amateur or professional, whether cultivating field or vacant lots. It tells how to prepare the soil, how to fertilize, how to select good seed, how to plant, how to tend the plant, how to prevent the ravages of insect pest and fungus disease, how to spray, how to dig, and how to store. A list of the varieties best suited to different districts in every province is also given.

CORN COMING TO CANADA

Ottawa.—The Canada food board announced today that owing to the transportation situation corn is now moving into the Dominion and will be available in larger quantities than during the recent months both for feeding livestock and for human consumption. Persons who wish to import corn either for feed or milling purposes should make application to the Canada food board for an import permit.

LOOK AFTER FARM TOOLS

Now is the time to put every farming utensil in working order. Farm machinery in recent years has played a very important role in crop production, and this year its place in farm operations is more important than ever before. They repair amount and kind of tools will enable the farmer to work more land and obtain better returns. In fact, the increased use of farm machinery frequently makes it possible to manage the farm with less help. One of the greatest causes of deterioration of farm tools and implements is their exposure to the weather and the failure upon the part of the farmer or laborer to clean them properly before they are put away for the season when they are not in active use.


INCREASE IN COW TESTING

of them." Many persons have been perfectly and permanently healed of chronic cases of so-called incurable disease by studying the Christian Science textbook. It will be soon that since it is divine Truth that brings freedom from human error, it matters not whether Truth comes to the individual through silent treatment, through the spoken word, or through reading and study. The essential thing is that it comes to the one who is receptive. When it does come to such an individual, it is a certain to displace in consciousness everything unlike itself, as that light will destroy darkness. And what happens when there is a case of Christian Science healing? Merely this: the light of Truth or divine intelligence penetrates the consciousness of the individual sufficiently clearly to dispel, at least in part, the darkness of ignorance, superstition, fear and sin, and the body responds to the change of state of consciousness. The body cannot do otherwise, for it does in itself have any power to be sick or to be well. The human body is grasped by, and held in, thought, as sure as the doll or the rubber ball is held in the hands of a little child. How important it is, then, that our thoughts should be controlled by Truth instead of error, by Life instead of death, by Spirit instead of matter. For as Mr. Hedy says on page 425 of Science and Health, "Consciousness constructs a better body when faith in matter has been conquered."

Jesus, the Christ

What was it that enabled Jesus to heal "all manner of sickness and all manner of disease" among the people of his time? What did Jesus mean when he said, "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest"? Surely he could not have meant that there was anything peculiar to the personal Jesus that could give rest and cure! For Jesus said, "The works that I do shall be done also." Must he not, then, have meant this: "Come unto the Christ, the true understanding of God, which I declare and teach and that will give you rest"? It was the Mind of Christ that healed, that Mind which "was all in Christ Jesus," and it is that same Christ-mind which heals today. There is no other redeemer or savior but the one eternal, immanent, always available, omnipotent, divine Christ. Christ is the way, Jesus was the Wayshower. He will not be acrologically contended that Jesus the Christ used drugs in healing, or that he depended upon matter to facilitate his cures. The gospel record shows that he healed the sick, reformed the sinner, raised the dead by the power of God, divine Spirit alone. If this spiritual method was God's way of healing in the time of Jesus, it must be His way now, for God is unchanging. If, on the other hand, the use of drugs is God's way, why did not Christ Jesus use them if the combined use of prayer and medicine is God's way, why did Christ Jesus combine them in his practice? It is obvious that if medicine is itself able to heal, prayer is not necessary adjunct of the healing. If prayer is efficacious, medicine is not needed. Christian science teaches that God's "grace is sufficient" at times and that His hand is not "shortened that it cannot save." But Christian Scientists do not claim that they never fall in their application of infinite Science. They realize that they are just beginning to understand and demonstrate Christian Science. In spite, however, of persecution and misrepresentation it has been proved in hundreds of thousands of instances that Christian Science is demonstrable and adequate.

Immortality of Works

The life of Christ Jesus makes the conclusion that he put his words above his words. Although Jesus said "though heaven and earth pass away, my words shall not pass away," he also said: "If I do not believe the works of my Father, believe me not. But if I do, though ye believe me not, believe the works." Perhaps another figure in history stands out distinctly as the exponent of the true of works, but in all ages men and women have been immortalized because of what they did for human race, rather than because what they said in doing it. For example, the utterances of Abraham Lincoln have not been excelled in beauty and truth by those of any of modern times. Yet if the words of Lincoln should be forgotten, he would continue to live in what he did, a stricken race and for a nation whose very existence was threatened. No modern movement more strongly emphasizes the importance of works than the movement which has been built upon the discovery of Christian Science. One cannot be a Christian Scientist unless he is willing to do works of Christian Science. The pathway leading to distant
