Dahlias and Potatoes.

By a curious horticultural irony the dahlia, which is the popular idyl of all our early autumn flower shows, has a dreadfully prosaic parentage. It has been developed from the Mexican tubers introduced about 120 years ago by the Swedish naturalist, Dr. Dahl, for the purely commercial purpose of supplementing the potato. They did not "catch on," and the dahlia bush soon disappeared from British tables, but our gardeners at once perceived the great potentialities of the flower and proceeded to produce the double dahlia and other delightful floral fantasies. The tuber and the dahlia, too acrid for our insular taste, are still eaten in some parts of France.—From the Dundee Advertiser.

Impure Air and Wrinkles.

Some recent writers on the subject of wrinkles hold that the air in our rooms should be changed three times every hour. The skin owes its beauty to the nerves which control the fine blood vessels of the surface, whose work lends glow and clearness to the face. The nerves in turn owe their sensitiveness to the air, which is our chief nutriment, inhaled by gallons hourly and should be pure and invigorating. When the nerves are weakened by close air the fine muscles lose their tone, the tissue of the face shrinks and these shrinkages become wrinkles.—From the London Globe.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years of age, may homestead land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made and cannot operate a condition by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Entry by "six months' residence" upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a homestead may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

CLEWS' REPORT.

New York, Nov. 20.—Financial problems are working their way out through a series of compromises. The general undertone in trade, industry and finance is one of confidence. Business continues large in volume, and the belief in continued activity is universal. Labor is well employed, and there would be little reason for hesitancy were it not for the phenomenal level of prices of commodities and securities. Complaints of the high cost of living are universal. There is good reason for many of these complaints, but the fact is they are frequently being made the most of as an excuse for advances in wages. The inflationary character of this tendency towards extravagance is more evident even in the home than in business of public affairs, and its effects in the long run cannot but be injurious.

Coming down to the stock market it appears to be dividing itself into two sections, the railroad and the industrial section. Railroad shares, though having undergone moderate declines of securities, are at a high level. In the industrial section of the market the outlook is somewhat brighter for the better because of securities, but the general outlook warrants hopefulness and caution. The copper situation here is improving, inasmuch as the price of copper has advanced, and is evidently trying to put an end to the present senseless policy of overproduction. Steel and real estate continues on a scale that creates suspicion.

DUN'S REVIEW.

Monetary anxieties have faded and business generally continues vigorous and active. The steel and iron trade has been most in vidence. In some other leading departments of commerce there may not be the same degree of activity, but there could be no uplift in iron and steel unless the whole industrial situation were improved.
