He went to the front with the first draft of the First Contingent, the 14th Battalion Royal Montreal Regiment. He has been in the thickest of the fighting, and has been buried four times by heavy shell fire.

Hon. J. D. Hazen Condoles With Wife of Hero

Letter Received by Mrs. Roy Burke, Whose Husband was Recently Killed in Action

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Ethel Burke of Arbeau, N. B., from Hon. J. D. Hazen: Ottawa, 30th, June 1916 Dear Mrs. Burke, It was with feelings of very great regret that I learned today of the death in action on June 16th, of your husband, Private Roy Burke. I am writing this letter for the purpose of extending my very sincere sympathy to you in your sad bereavement. Nothing, of course, can lessen the effect of the blow and of the sorrow caused to you and his family and intimate friends, but at the same time it is a satisfaction to know that he died, serving his country, fighting in defence of those who are left at home and of the free institutions that are so dear to the heart of every Canadian and Britisher.
