SOME days ago, one of the Ladies of the Convent de Notre Dame, in this city, while walking upon one of our rutted sidewalks, sprained her ankle so severely, that she has since been unable to walk. Had this accident occurred to a member of the accompanying body known as Commercial Travellers, the city would probably be heavily mired in damages, as they were in Haiti's case, but as it happened to a poor Sister, they are not likely to hear of it.

At 1:30 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, an alarm of fire was rung out for Ward 4, and proved to be for a building in the rear of Mr. Steele's residence, on Grafton Street, near the Prince of Wales Colliery. The Engines and Hook & Ladder Co. turned out in full force, but the only fire observed was quickly extinguished by Mr. James Goodman, painter, who, mounting a ladder, extracted the burning shingles from the roof, and blew the blaze out. James should be made an honorary member of the Fire Brigade.

PATRICK DELANEY and Thomas Caffrey, charged with participation in the Phoenix Park murders, have pleaded guilty, and been sentenced to be hanged. Delaney's sentence has been commuted to penal servitude for life, as he had no actual participation in the murder, although present in the Park at the time, through intimidation. Joseph Hanlon, one of the prisoners awaiting trial, turned informer. James Mullet and William Murphy have pleaded guilty to the charge of conspiracy to murder, and Lawrence Hanlon has been found guilty on the same charge, and sentenced to penal servitude for life. Kelly and Fitzharris are to be tried again, the latter on another charge. True Bills have been found by the Grand Jury against Sheridan, Walsh, and Tyan (No. 1).

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS. THE next examinations for entrance into the Civil Service will commence at the several places named in the Civil Service Act, commencing on TUESDAY, the 13th JUNE, at 10 a.m. and at Victoria, B. C., on TUESDAY, the 19th JUNE, at the same hour. Applications must be sent to the Secretary of the Board of Civil Service Examiners by the 13th May.

Candidates who passed the preliminary examination in November last, will not require to do so again, and candidates who passed the qualifying exam, may come up for examination in optional subjects, without re-examination. New sets of certificates of age, health and character will not be required from the last two classes, but the fee of \$2 will have to be paid, and the Secretary must be informed of their intention to present themselves.
