

Industrial conditions were seri usly disturbed by Labor Disputes during July, the number in existence in that month being considerably during June. The number actually compares favorably with that of the found previous month. In all forty-six isputes were reported to the Department, an increase of nine as mpared with June and an increase of twenty-eight as compared with July, 1911. About 17,000 employees were affected by these disputes as compared with 15,000 during June and 19,000 during July, 1911.
