TRAPPER FROZEN TO DEATH ON TRAIL NORTH OF PRAIRIE CREEK. Gustave Froemer Found Dead by Constable Thorne—His Partner, Henry Daniels, Able to Reach Trapper's Camp and Send Word to R. N. W. M. P.—Daniels Also Very Seriously Frozen.

Gustave Froemer was found frozen to death sixty miles north of Prairie Creek, on February 5th, by Constable Thorne, of the R.N.W.M.P. Froemer and his partner, Henry Daniels, owing to bad luck, were compelled to leave their line of traps on the Simonette river and were trying to reach Prairie Creek.
