THE FISHERIES TREATY

An Agreement With Canada and Newfoundland.

LARGE CONCESSIONS TO AMERICANS.

Question of Duties Unsettled.

PRESIDENT APPROVES OF TREATY.

HALIFAX, N.S., Feb. 22.

The Fisheries Treaty, published to-day, shows that previous telegraphic summaries were correct. An agreement, pending the sanction of the treaty, has been made for two years. According to this agreement, Canada and Newfoundland grant American vessels, for a license of one dollar and fifty cents per ton, the privilege to enter ports and purchase bait and all other supplies; together with the right to tranship catch, and ship crews. If the United States removes the duties on British fish, license will be issued free. The President sends a message to the Senate warmly approving of the treaty.

FROM SHOAL HARBOR.

A Saw-Mill Destroyed by Fire.

SHOAL HARBOR, This Evening.

On Monday last the saw-mill at North Random, worked by Charles Clench, was destroyed by fire at midnight, together with the sails and rigging of a fishing boat. The mill being under repair at the time, all the carpenters' tools were destroyed. A severe loss has thus been inflicted upon several parties. It rained heavily last night and there is splendid skating to-day.

FROM CAPE RACE.

SUPREME COURT.

Corbett vs. Foote.

In this case, which was tried before Mr. Justice Little and a special jury during the last term, and which resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff for the sum of \$961, and against the defendant, on a counter-claim, for \$2,060, a rule for a new trial was granted and argued during the January sitting of the court. Mr. Justice Little delivered his verdict to-day, discharging the rule and upholding the verdict of the jury. Mr. Justice Pihent dissented from his brother Judges. The Chief Justice agreeing with Mr. Justice Little, the rule was discharged. Verdict to stand. Written judgments were given by all the Judges. Mr. Greene and Mr. Shea for plaintiff; Attorney General and Mr. Morrison for defendant.
