The attack by an Afghan ghazi upon two American women in the Mosque of Omar in Jerusalem is explained as an act of resentment against disturbing worship. The women profaned the mosque with their street shoes, talking loudly and took photographs. If this is the case they deserved reproof, though hardly revolver shots.

The sacristan when appealed to shrugged his shoulders helplessly. "Foresters," he exclaimed: "a foreigner!" Mrs. Trollope describes a Holy Week service in St. Peter's, Rome. Just at the elevation of the host the solemn hush of thousands was broken by the popping of a champagne cork in the tribune reserved for English visitors. The desecration of the Taj Mahal in India by luncheon parties is a frequent offence.

The cities of the "grand tour" in Europe are used to hordes of tourists who chatter past altars during services, talking loudly; but there are parts of the world that take such offences seriously. It costs 10 cents in Cairo for a Frank to enter a mosque. In Constantinople a dollar, in Morocco his life unless he is lucky. It is not so long ago that a tourist was killed there for that offence, and another for breaking the commandment against image-making by photographing a sheik.

Jerusalem, a holy city to Moslem and Jew as well as to warring monks and many creeds, does not lightly pardon offences against worship. A famous quarrel between monks at the Holy Sepulchre was the cause of the Crimean War.

NEW IRON AND COAL COMPANY.

MONTREAL, April 20. — A new \$35,000,000 Company, to be called the Dominion Iron and Coal Co., Ltd., changing its shares at par for the shares of the old companies, and a cash bonus of four dollars per share declared on the capital of the new Company, these are to be paid quarterly beginning July 1st. Is the policy announced to-day by Mr. J. H. Plummer.

A general meeting of the directors of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company was held to-day at the Bank of Commerce. Amongst those present were: Sir Montague Allan, Senator Mackay, Sir Henry Pellatt, Messrs. James Crathern, and F. L. Wanklyn, with Mr. Plummer in the chair.

Offer to Accept Terms.

The holders of large amounts of common stock in both companies have asked their respective bodies to submit the proposal to the shareholders and a circular giving full particulars will at once be issued to other shareholders of common stock in the two companies.

A very large percentage of the holders of the steel and coal stock have already signified their acceptance of the above terms.

Some of the many customers have extraordinary notions regarding clothing, and now and again I am called upon to make a suit from material which is never found within a tailor's shop, said a fashionable tailor in the West End to the writer the other day. Only last week an elderly gentleman required me to make a suit out of a blanket which he had dyed a purple brown.

A prominent K. C. always wears a brown suit, and during the last three years he has to my knowledge never ordered a suit of any other color. He dons trousers and coat of a brown hue because that is the color of his wife's hair. Whenever he requires a new suit he invariably sends me a small tuft of hair from his wife's head, with a request for a pattern as near to the shade as possible.

A stock broker wears great and under coats with movable sleeves. The sleeves are fastened to the shoulder by an ingenious arrangement of his own invention and the fit of the garment is not interfered with in any way.
