

Revolutionists Grow Stronger.

SHANGHAI, To-day.
The most interesting development yesterday was the completion of the organization of the local cabinet by the revolutionists. Wu Ting Fang, who formerly had the post of Minister at Washington, has been appointed head of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The appointments are not taken seriously, the appointees having no knowledge of the action of the revolutionists, except in the case of the Civil Administrator, who has been acting in that official's capacity throughout. Wu Ting Fang, while declining to acknowledge any participation in the revolutionary administration at Shanghai, openly sympathizes with it, although he criticizes some of its methods. He opposed the Manchu clique at Pekin. Shao Hing, for its province, Che Kiang, famous for its mines, Quipsan and Kashing of the same province, have peacefully surrendered to the rebels and order is being maintained. With the exception of Wush, all important points on the railroad from Shanghai to Chih Kiang are now in the hands of the revolutionists. Nanking is still outwardly loyal and quiet, but the Tartar general is so unpopular that an upheaval threatens.

when the Portia was in that section, were hauling their trawls and were loading their dorries off two tubs of gear. The fish taken are of large size and fine quality. All along the coast, more particularly from Lamaline to Mortier Bay, more fish is to be had than at any time during the past season. None of the ordinary Cape St. Mary's boats are out, but a number of smaller boats are working off shore. There is more cod off Cape St. Mary's than for months past, but no one is fishing there and the opinion of passengers from up the coast, as well as that of Capt. Fitzpatrick, is that there should be a winter fishery from Lamaline down to Bay de Verde, when hundreds of thousands of quintals would be procured when so much cod is about with great corresponding benefit to the country. Now that the motor boat is being so extensively used the danger from boisterous winter weather would be lessened and the voyage could be prosecuted with success and safety.

NO SIGN OF FURS.—There was a poor sign of furs at Gross Water Bay and Hamilton Inlet when the Stella Maris left the place last week.

LONDON, Nov. 6.
An American diplomat, just arrived from Constantinople, confirms the report of a recent improvement in the Turkish position in Tripoli, due to the arrival there of a large number of Turkey's best army officers. They reached the front by passing through Egypt.

MALTA, Nov. 6.
A steamer with passengers arrived here from Tripoli. They declare the situation there to be a reign of terror. Strong military patrols are continually conducting rigorous house to house searches on the smallest pretence. Summary punishment is meted out, and many victims have been shot in their own houses. Foreigners have taken refuge in their respective consulates. An order forbidding any one to be out before 6 a.m. and after 6 p.m. is being strictly enforced, and men, women or children who disobey the order are being shot down.

LONDON, Nov. 6.
"I gather that the proposal made in the speech was not intended seriously." Such was the comment of the Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, when questioned in the House of Commons to-day regarding the remarks of Champ Clark concerning the annexation of Canada. He declined to instruct Ambassador Bryce to report fully on the incident, adding that the Ambassador would, doubtless, do so if he considered the matter of sufficient importance. In his speech at Tremont, Nebraska, on Thursday, Clark said that nine-tenths of the people of America favoured the annexation of Canada, and added that he would run for the presidency on the annexation platform, against Taft on a platform opposing annexation, he would carry every State in the Union.

LONDON, Nov. 6.
The Greek steamer Lord Byron from Odessa for Antwerp, foundered in the English Channel during a gale last night. Twenty-two were lost and three saved.

TEHRAN, Persia, Nov. 6.
The Russian Minister to-day presented an ultimatum to the Persian Government setting forth that unless the Persian Minister of Foreign Affairs apologized for an alleged insult to the Russian Vice-Consul, on the occasion of the seizure of the property of Shua Ez Sultan, which was removed to the Treasury by gendarmes and reinstated the Persian Cossacks formerly there, Russia would occupy the Provinces of Ghilan and Maaan derain in North Persia, bordering on the Caspian Sea. The Government has decided not to comply with the Russian demand.

DROWNED AT LABRADOR.—A boy named Montag was drowned at North West River, Labrador, last week. The little chap was only seven years of age, he fell through the ice of the river.

Buried Alive in a Sand Bin.

Sudden Collapse Plunged Workman Overhead in Smothering Wreckage—Extricated Too Late—Victim, a Native of Newfoundland, Had Been Working Here All Summer.
This morning about 9 o'clock a man named Denis Kehoe was killed while working on a new elevator in the harbor. He was engaged on a piece of work at the side of a large bin, in which was stored sand for use in the concrete work. The bin suddenly collapsed, burying Kehoe beneath the sand and wreck. His mates extricated him within a couple of minutes, but not soon enough to save his life. The General Hospital ambulance was summoned and the physician in charge had the body removed to the morgue.
The official explanation given of the accident is as follows:—Kehoe was engaged with a gang of men putting up temporary shoring, that is, vertical timbers for supporting a weight, the weight in this case being the sand and storage bins. While this was being done, a shore kicked out, letting a joist fall. This let out a portion of the bins of sand.
The deceased lost his head, and rushed under the falling timber and sand. It is said the foreman, Mr. J. Flynn, held on to the man, and was himself embedded in the sand and debris. The accident occurred on Elevator No. 2, section 19.
Kehoe came to Montreal a week ago, and took up residence at the Royal Hotel on Notre Dame street. He is a single man, aged 34, and had travelled all over the world on steamers as a fireman. He had no relations here, his native place being River Head, Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, where his mother lives. He also has a sister in Boston.
His death was caused by a blow on the head, and from broken limbs. He lived only for a few minutes after being struck.
A coroner's inquest will be held to-morrow morning.—Montreal Witness, Nov. 2.
