The ceiling, which is decorated with richly gilded carved work, is attributed to Domenichino. An oil painting of the Madonna is attributed to the same master.

"Proud of the Man and Proud of the Country That Produced Him."

Dear Sir.—As there are a great many people in St. John's and elsewhere who are really anxious to hear the truth with regard to those meetings held from place to place by Mr. Coaker, I crave permission to lay before the readers of the Evening Telegram a plain statement of facts as they presented themselves to me. It has been my good fortune to be in Spaniard's Bay at the time that Mr. Coaker decided to hold a meeting here. I want it to be understood that I came here not to make of myself a trumpet for W. F. Coaker, but on purely private affairs that have nothing whatever to do with the F. P. U. or Mr. Coaker. The first thing that appeared to me on my arrival here was that there was a great deal of hostility towards this man Coaker and the F. P. U. This unfriendliness

Arose through ignorance of the aims and objects of the F. P. U., and needless to say, the feeling has been fostered by a few, who also through ignorance or worse, thought that the F. P. U. meant a menace to themselves and endangered their positions. (Soft jobs.)

SPANIARD'S BAY, To-day.
Mr. Coaker arrived at Bryant's Cove at noon yesterday, and held a public meeting in the school building there, which was largely attended. He spoke for two hours and established a Local Council to serve Bryant's Cove and St. John's. A large number were enrolled. He then drove to Island Cove and at 7.30 addressed a crowded meeting at the new Orange Hall. Mr. J. A. Mercer presided. The President's address lasted over two hours, having the usual effect and when he closed the audience cheered him and the F.P.U. and the Liberal Party. A Council was then established, when a large number enrolled. Mr. J. H. Mercer was selected Chairman of the meeting which closed at midnight. Mr. Coaker left for Spaniard's Bay. Although he went as a total stranger to Island Cove, and arrived after dark, he was tendered a splendid reception, volleys of musketry greeted him as soon as it was known he had arrived. Several of the men at Island Cove will join the Union. At Spaniard's Bay last night a Union meeting was held to elect officers and initiate members in the Parish Hall. A large number were enrolled. Mr. Coaker has established in Harbor Grace District the following Councils: Coley's Point, Bay Roberts, Spaniard's Bay, Bryant's Cove and Island Cove. He has ready about 600 members have enrolled. He left for St. John's this morning.
