Father Cacciola  
at Work Again.

It is a source of the purest gratifi-  
cation to relate that Rev. Father Cac-  
ciola is now restored to his former  
vigorous state of health and useful-  
ness.

Since his return to Placentia Bay he  
has made a complete visitation of all  
the stations attached to his mission  
completing the same within the  
Paschal time. He attends the follow-  
ing: Bar Haven, where he resides;  
Bruley, Indian Harbour, Merry Har-  
bour, Harbour Island, Davies Harbour,  
Civily's Harbour, Southern Harbour,  
LaManche, Come by Chance, Arnold's  
Cove, Black River, Piper's Hollow,  
Sound Island and Ballardstown. He  
attends calls in other missions very  
frequently.

For a young priest he has no equal  
as a builder in the Archdiocese. Very  
soon he will have added nine (9)  
buildings to his little mission.

Again, he has never failed, once to  
be on time to see every subject of his  
mission before death overtook them.

Wind and storm have no terror for  
him; at all hours of the night and day  
he is ready when duty calls him. He  
was out all Tuesday night, on a sick  
call near St. Kyrans; it was a severe  
night. There are dangers to face some  
time, more by water rarely by land.

The sick call that brought him near  
the mainland last January afforded  
him the chance to hasten to the city  
with plans for furnishings intended  
for his new church. He returned to  
face the trackless woods via Come by  
Chance at 3 o'clock on the morning of  
the 24th of January. Believing his  
people at Come by Chance station  
were not up at that hour and keeping  
no boat waiting for him he endeavoured  
to reach Sound Island via the terri-  
ble blizzard broke and blocked his way  
compelling him to be nearly two days  
out. Finally he took his way north-  
ern and reached Black River.

It was in the performance of his  
duty and zeal to reach his destination  
that brought about his sad plight. He  
could easily have awakened the people  
at the station located at Come by  
Chance and not suffered in the least if  
he chose to remain there three or four  
days. He has no regrets to offer and  
will willingly suffer untold hardships  
for the cause of God and country. —  
Com.

Excellent griddle cakes can be made  
with a small quantity of boiled rice  
left over. Such rice is always good for  
croquettes.

Sun your mattress as often as you  
can. Put them out on the porch roof  
in the hot sun. This will keep them  
fresh and clean.

Lower the temperature of an oven  
considerably after the roast has been  
in twenty minutes and the juices will  
be retained.

It is a good idea to have a hot roast  
for dinner the day you iron. The  
meat can cook over the ironing fire,  
thereby saving coal.

If a coat of thin white paint is put  
on the ordinary wire screen, those in-  
side may look out, but outsiders can-  
not see into the room.

Put a little borax in the water in  
which you wash table covers, dollies,  
towels, etc., having red borders. The  
borax will keep the color bright.

When making apple jelly, put a rose  
green leaf in the bottom of each  
glass before putting the jelly in; it  
will give it an excellent flavor.

When ironing have a number of coat  
hangers upon which to put shirtwaists  
or children's dresses. This keeps  
them in much better shape.

Five cents' worth of tartar emetic,  
mixed with an equal amount of sugar,  
moistened and placed where the ants  
are, will drive them away.

To protect comforters from soil, cut  
a strip of cheesecloth 12 inches  
wide on the top of the comforter and  
embroider initials in the middle strip.

In peeling tomatoes, the flavour is  
best retained by using a knife. If  
they are scalded, the skin comes out  
much easier, but the flavor is some-  
what spoiled.

A convenient use for an old wash  
bottle is to stand it on the back porch,  
put into it all the waste paper and  
trash to be burned; and when full, set  
a match to it.

A good fruit filling for a cake is  
made of one orange peeled and cut  
fine, a can of pineapple and three ba-  
nanas sliced thin. Drain and put be-  
tween two layers of cake.

If there is a bit of cold ham left  
over, chop it fine, add an equal quan-  
tity of sugar, potatoes and hold to-  
gether with an egg. Shape like po-  
tato cakes and saute in butter.
