### Cable News.

**OTTAWA, To-day.**  
The position of Solicitor General of Canada has been offered to Arthur Meighen, member of Portage La Prairie, and accepted.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
Lloyd George introduced into the Commons a Bill to amend the Insurance Act, which Liberal members acknowledged will probably only be the first of a long series of amending measures.

**AMSTERDAM, To-day.**  
The election for the second chamber of the States General resulted in the return of thirty Liberals, seven Democrats, eighteen Socialists, twenty-five Roman Catholics. Former majority of coalition Catholics and Clericals is reduced into a minority of ten; resignation of the ministry is expected.

**OTTAWA, To-day.**  
Eight dead; over fifty injured, two probably fatally, is the toll of the railway accident three miles from Ottawa this afternoon when the C. P. R. Winnipeg train left the track. All the dead and practically all the injured are immigrants principally from the British Isles. The cause of the wreck is not known but it is thought to have been either a loose rail or what is known in railway parlance as a sun-kink.

**WASHINGTON, To-day.**  
Free sugar in 1916, free raw wool now was established in the Tariff Revision Bill, having been reported yesterday by Democratic caucus of Senate after a two days' fight. The sugar schedule as reported by the majority of members of the Finance Committee, practically as it passed the House, was approved by a vote of forty to six. Free raw wool, as submitted by a majority just as it passed the House, swept the Senate caucus by a vote of forty-one to six.

**MARSHFIELD, Oregon, To-day.**  
Business houses closed for an hour yesterday, while the proprietors joined several hundred men driving two industrial workers world leaders out of the town, with warnings never to return. The citizens then marched to the building where the workers have been accustomed to gather, gave the proprietors notice and all other members of the organization and their sympathizers they would be similarly treated. The industrial workers were involved in several strikes at saw mills in this region recently.

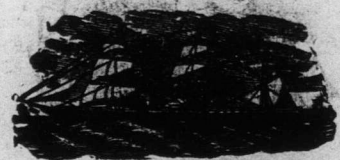
