Taking No Chances.

A potential German naval base in the Virgin Islands has been seized by the U. S. Alien Property Custodian and will be used for the needs of the American Navy and Customs Department. The base consists of land, buildings, docks, warehouses, large water tanks, cisterns, lighters, loading paraphernalia and coaling facilities, formerly owned by the Hamburg-American line. A few days ago two men were recaptured after a week's freedom. They were actually discovered in an aeroplane about to fly away. Their names are Walther Kleiscaberg and Max Marzinke. Although the surrounding country wa thoroughly searched for a week nothing was seen of the men until an air mechanic spotted them sitting in an aeroplane in the ground of an aero drome. The fugitives were fully equipped, even to goggles, as officers posed on an air mechanic that a mathine was being prepared for them t make a flight, when one of the men made a remark in a foreign accent and so aroused suspicion.
