British Unionists
Uncertain of Victory.
 Fate of Coalition to be Decided on Thursday -- Women Votes Becoming Active -- Danger Not Yet Over in Near East -- Railway Strike in Ireland.

CONSERVATIVES MEET.
 LONDON, Oct. 16. Conservative members of the Government are summoned to meet to decide whether they shall continue support of the Coalition under the leadership of Lloyd George. The meeting is called by Chamberlain, who will include not only the Conservatives in the Cabinet, but also the Secretary of State for the Colonies. It is believed that Chamberlain will be backed by Balfour, Birkenhead and Sir Robert Horne, in accordance to the Premier.

BRITISH POLITICS.
 LONDON, Oct. 16. This has been a day of feverish activity in Downing Street, the chief element being the summons to the Unionist members of the Cabinet of three hundred and fifty Unionist members of the House of Commons to a Conference at the Carlton Club on Friday to decide whether to break up the Coalition or to stand by Lloyd George. The decision to call a meeting was made at 11 Downing Street. Austin Chamberlain's Home, after a consultation of Mr. Chamberlain with Unionist colleagues. Mr. Chamberlain will ask for a vote of confidence and on this will depend the fate of the Coalition and the general election. Ominous rumours are coming from Labor quarters.

FRENCH COMMANDER ASKS REINFORCEMENTS.
 CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 16. The French military commander at Adrianople has requested "General Charpy to send immediate reinforcements to Eastern Thrace. He declares the situation is fraught with danger.

BRITAIN NOT AGREEABLE.
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. British rejection of the United States proposal for a treaty to extend the right of search of vessels up to 12 miles off shore was contained in a note to Secretary Hughes to-day, by Ambassador Geddes.

IRISH RAILWAY STRIKE.
 BELFAST, Oct. 16. Dublin advices to-day reported that the city is isolated from Southern Ireland owing to the strikes on the Great Southern and Western System, Ireland's largest railroad.

HALF MILLION LOST ON FOUR-OUNCE SHORTAGE.
 PARIS, Oct. 16. Lack of four ounces in weight, carried by Dauphin, in the Municipal Council stakes at Longchamps on Saturday, cost the owners nearly five hundred thousand francs in stake money and bets, Dauphin being disqualified although coming in first in the race. Jockey Sharpe weighed out correctly but the girth snapped and was replaced, and on weighing in was then found to be four ounces lighter.

AN OUTRAGE THAT FAILED.
 BELFAST, Oct. 16. Extensive search is being conducted for an unknown man who, on Sunday night, was discovered by the police in the act of setting a bomb in the residence of the Lord Mayor of Belfast, at Carrick Fergus, nine miles east of the city. The man escaped in the darkness when followed by the police and the bomb was destroyed.

CANADA WILL NEGOTIATE DIRECT.
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. It is announced here that Canada will negotiate directly with the United States in framing the new treaty to regulate the naval strength of the Great Lakes instead of through the British Embassy, as such negotiations would have been conducted in the past. This has been sanctioned by the British Government. A representative of the Canadian Government is expected in Washington in the near future to begin the negotiations, the foundations for which were laid during the visit here of Premier Mackenzie King in July.

PRISONERS ESCAPE.
 DUBLIN, Oct. 16. During the week end, about one hundred and forty prisoners escaped from the Internment Camp at New Bridge Barracks, near Carragh, thru unused sewer.

THE POLE NEXT.
 OTTAWA, Oct. 16. As a result of the Arctic voyage of Captain Bernier in regions southwest of Greenland, known under the names of Islands of the Archipelago, Canada, now possesses new postal districts, Craig Harbor and Ellismore Island in Pond Inlet in Baffin Land. It is the first and probably the most northern postal district in the world, being only eight hundred and fifty miles from the Pole.

Physician Disregarded.
 Dear Sir.—In yesterday morning's News a letter was published over the signature L.H.F. written presumably by one of the city patients of the Sanitarium, who is undergoing treatment there, dealing with the food served to those who are bedridden, and consequently whose digestion is so impaired that a special diet is required for them. This correspondent further alleges that Dr. Rendell makes in his requisition for supplies a list of lighter foods for these special cases. But Dr. Rendell is told that such cannot be furnished. The supplies sent in must suffice, and patients must eat these or move out. Now, Mr. Editor, this is not good enough, neither is it the first time of occurrence, for it has happened before on the part of the Minister of Public Works, and it is as well for that gentleman to understand right now, that neither patients nor public will tolerate such treatment any longer. The Department of Works can find money to squander on extravagant works, but when it comes to the sick and dying, and letting the patients at the Sanitarium pine away for lack of necessary nourishment, as prescribed by the respected physician in charge, Mr. Jennings draws the line very sharply. It is, therefore, up to the Minister of Works to explain to the public why he refuses chicken and other light foods to the more delicate patients at the Sanitarium. It is up to you, Sir.

What is the significance of the word "Apocalypse?"  We strongly recommend the fishermen not alone to hold back their fish, but to make all they possibly can into dry shore cure, as there is no hope now to sell large quantities of soft
