Produce and Provisions.

Codfish—The exports of codfish this week amounted to 21,349 qtls. as follows:—

From Outports—By schr. C. Bryant from the Union Export Co., Port Union, 1,410 qtls. to Kingston, Jamaica. By schr. General A. Wood from W. T. Hollet, Burin, 3,329 qtls. to Cirita, Vechia, Italy. By schr. Roy Bruce, from E. M. Hollett, Burin, 4,216 qtls. to Oporto.

From St. John's—By schr. Evelyn from Bowring Bros., 4,143 qtls. to Bahia. By schr. Frank H. Adams from Monroe Export Co., 3,040 qtls. to Oporto. By schr. Robert J. Dale, 3,095 qtls. to Barbados, from R. F. Goodridge, Tor's Cove Trading Co., A. E. Hickman Co., Campbell & Co., Kay, Geo. M. Barr and Tinsler & Co. By S.S. Rosalind to New York for transshipment to West Indies, 2,114 qtls. from Geo. M. Barr, E. J. Godden, A. E. Hickman Co., The Kennedy Co., and Harvey & Co. The markets are taking on better as the winter advances, and consumption is improving all round. There was some price cutting in the Italian market this week, but it is believed to be only a temporary flurry and that the market will quickly recover.

Cod Oil—The export of cod oil this week was 668 gallons to New York per S.S. Rosalind, from Messrs. Job Bros. & Co. Ltd. and A. Ebsary. The market is firm and enquiries are increasing. By a new chemical eliminating process, fish oils are now being used in edible products with great acceptance, and both seal oil and whale oil as well as purified cod oil, are now being successfully used in the manufacture of butterine in the Scandinavian countries and Denmark. The demand for all fish oils is therefore on the increase for the ingredients in food products as well as for soaps, and the prices are going up accordingly. This accounts for the renewed activity in whaling circles in Norway just now.

Cod Liver Oil—This product has shown more activity in the markets, owing to the increased demand usual at this season of the year. Quite a fair business is reported to have been done in January delivery. Prices are a shade higher and it is to be hoped that they will maintain present values if not go higher. It is anticipated that any further increase will be held back by the result of the Norwegian catch now in progress, is known. Everything depends on the result of this fishery. Norway piled up nearly double the quantity of ordinary years last season, but it is rarely we see two years alike. The export this week was 413 gallons to New York from Job Bros. & Co. Ltd., in the S.S. Rosalind.

Flour—Chicago wheat for May delivery hovered between 116 and 117 all the week, and Winnipeg between 112 and 113. This is considered a satisfactory state of affairs for flour dealers, and an easy market is expected to be maintained around these limits throughout the winter, presuming that the farmers are larger since new year, the European situation as regards the Franco-German and Turkish troubles does not develop into actual warfare. There is an abundance of wheat in the west, and Winnipeg cash wheat is weakening all the winter. The local quotation is \$9.00 for leading brands.

Beef—The beef market continues strong and prices are now at the highest point for over a year. Beef is scarce, especially boneless, which the packers are slow to supply, even at the high prices. The bulk of the beef is going fresh in New York and Chicago during the cold weather. With the Advent weather the barrelled beef will increase and lower prices will rule. Boneless is \$21.50 here, high grades from \$23 to \$24.50 for family beef.

Pork—There is no important change in the barrelled pork market this week. Ham Butt is a little easier but other grades are unchanged. Fat Back is \$28. The market seems to be on the weak side, especially in Ham Butt. There is very little doing and only a few barrels arrived on the St. Lawrence. There will be a dull spurt till April. Meantime there will be only a hand to mouth trade.

Molasses—There is a firm feeling amongst exporters at Barbados, who seem determined not to come down from the opening price of 45 cents per wine gallon f.o.b. for fancy molasses. The crop of sugar has been

above the average, but there is no surplus on hand from the previous year, as was the case in 1922. The new molasses in quantity will be ready the latter part of February, but there probably will not be any Newfoundland arrivals till April. The present Barbados quotation will make molasses here about 30 cents a gallon landed.

Sugar—Cables received from New York Thursday were to the effect that refined sugar had made a sharp advance of 25 cents per 100 lbs. in that market. Domestic demand in the United States has been usually heavy for the season the past month, and is said to be the chief factor in sugar strength. The refineries are now working full capacity in order to keep pace with the demands, and there are fair stocks held in the St. John's market. Transactions are few and there is very little coming forward since new year.

Hay—The market is quiet at last week's prices, and there are very few transactions except in small lots required by teamsters and cabmen of the city. The S.S. Canadian Sapper this week brought in 733 bales from Halifax. There is a full supply in the city now, and several importers who are not regular dealers have stocks of hay which they are selling at cut prices for spot cash in lots of a ton or more, \$27 and \$28. The regular price is \$29 to \$40.

Oats—The S.S. Canadian Sapper had 382 sacks in her inward cargo from Halifax this week. As in the case of hay, the trade is confined now to the city and is limited to the small orders from town and suburb and horse and cattle owners. The fact that farmers have a good supply of "home grown" makes this trade even smaller than it has been in other years. The quotations are \$3.90 for black, \$3.85 for white, and for mixed \$3.70.

Potatoes—The price of home grown potatoes advanced to \$4 per barrel this week for selected stock, which, when they are good, some people prefer to the imported article, and for which they are willing to give a higher price. Imported P.E.I. are supplying the bulk of the demand, however, and are selling still at \$3.60 per sack of 180 lbs., and \$1.90 for the half sack. The S.S. Kyle brought in 570 barrels from Sydney this week.

Shorthand Competition.

AWARDED SILVER MEDALS.

Seven medals were awarded in the last Semi-Annual International Competition of the Shorthand Society. As usual entries were received from all parts of the English speaking world. Two of the silver medals in Class II for the best papers in reporting style were gained by Newfoundland competitors Miss Susie Crane and Miss Margaret O'Brien, both of the Commercial Department of the Academy of Our Lady of Mercy, St. John's.

Appeal For Funds.

IN A WORTHY CAUSE.

As the funds are fast ebbing out and as a great number of Masters and Navigating and Engineer Officers of the Mercantile Marine are in urgent need owing to long unemployment, the Central Committee of the Mercantile Marine Masters and Officers Relief Fund are making a further appeal for financial assistance to supplement the resources of the fund in order to enable them to continue temporarily assisting these officers in their desperate plight. They receive no unemployment dole and have all done splendid service to their country during the war. The appeal states that the operations of the Committee have revealed the existence of a pitiable amount of distress calling urgently for relief. The fund is gratuitously and very carefully administered by a Central and Local Committees of leading representatives of the different shipping interests and organizations. Nearly £30,000 has been expended in giving financial assistance in some 1500 necessitous and urgent cases. These grants are made wholly irrespective of membership of applicants of any particular organization. Contributions to the fund will be thankfully received by the Secretary, 28 St. Mary Axe, London, E. C. 3, who will be glad to supply any further particulars which may be desired.

Passengers who arrived on Saturday by S. S. Portia report that schr. Frank R. Forsey, which sank in the harbour after a collision with the Grand Bank pier about 2 weeks ago, is now moored at the inside basin. It seems that after the vessel's salt cargo had washed out of the hull, or had melted, the schooner floated on her own account. Beyond having some eight or ten planks started in the forward part of the vessel, due to the collision, the Forsey is not badly damaged, and after the necessary repairs have been effected the vessel will be as good as ever. The Forsey is owned by W. R. Forsey and was bound from Oporto via St. Lawrence when the accident occurred.
