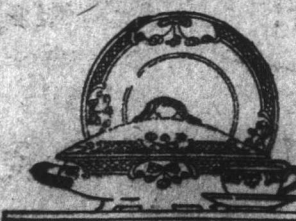

BYE ELECTION CONTEST IN HAR. GRACE.

Nomination proceedings for the bye elections in the Districts of St. John's East and West, Harbor Main, Placentia and Harbor Grace took place yesterday. In St. John's West, Hon. Sir John Crosbie, Minister of Finance, was proposed by Mr. C. P. Ayre, seconded by Mr. John Barron, with Mr. Geo. Whitten as witness. In the Eastern District, Hon. W. J. Higgins, Minister of Justice was proposed by Mr. Lloyd Chaplin, seconded by Mr. J. P. Crotty, with Mr. Arthur Snow as witness. In Harbor Main, Hon. William Woodford, Minister of Posts was nominated. The proposer was Jas. Woodford, seconded John Kennedy, both of Harbor Main, witness, Jas. Leary, Conception Harbor. The nomination of Mr. Wm. Walsh as Minister of Agriculture and Mines took place at Placentia. There were no opposition candidates and all four were declared elected by acclamation. In Harbor Grace, Hon. J. R. Bennett, Colonial Secretary, and Mr. C. E. Russell, Minister of Public Works, were nominated as were two Hickman-Coaker candidates, Mr. Frank Archibald and Mr. John Snow. The former was defeated in the general election of June 3rd. Mr. Snow is a new applicant for political honors.
