No Trace of Missing Men

As yet nothing has been heard of the missing men from the Metagama. It is now learned that only two are missing, a third class passenger and an able seamon. The American Coast Guard steamer which arrived in port last night after a four days search reported having seen no sign of the missing boat. A despatch from Hali-

fax dated June 23rd say: "No trace has yet been found of the missing boat centaining one seaman, one fireman and one passenger which put off from the Metagama following collision with Clara Camus on Thursday of last week according to report from U. S. Cutter Modoc, which arrived in port last night being forced to give up search owing to shortage of fuel oil. It is presumed the boat was either picked up by a passing vessel or is still adrift.
