no grants of land had been given to
any person whatsoever since his as-
sumption of office.**Mr. Ashbourne** asked the Hon. the
Prime Minister if it is the intention
of the Government to remove the tax
on cod oil.**The Prime Minister** replied that
the matter was engaging the atten-
tion of the Government who had not
yet made up their minds as to their
course of action.**Mr. Puddister** asked the Minister
of Education if it is the intention of
the Government to reduce the amount
voted annually for the Augmentation
of Teachers salaries and apply such
reduction to a grant for the operation
of the Normal School or Junior Col-

be discontinued.**ORDER OF THE DAY.****The Bill** relating to Stipendiary
Magistrates was read a third time
and sent to the Legislative Council
for concurrence.**Mr. Halfyard's Bill** to amend the
Election Act 1913 was then taken up
for second reading. This Bill estab-
lishes Booths in an election at the
Humber, Grand Falls, Bell Island, etc.
The Hon. Colonial Secretary, re-
viewed at some length the whole con-
duct of elections. He thought the re-
distribution of seats for the whole
Island should be carefully considered.
Three men and two men districts
were not conducive to the best in-
terests of the district nor to the re-
presentatives. Booths if they were
opened at all should be opened for
every district in the Island. Four
years would elapse before the nextGeneral Election took place which
gave ample time for careful con-
sideration. He suggested to the in-
troduction of the Bill that it be referred
to a Select Committee where the
whole matter would get careful con-
sideration.**Mr. Halfyard** explained his reasons
for the introduction of the Bill and
told of the disfranchisement of elec-
tors at the last election. He still
pressed for second reading.**The Minister of Justice** spoke
along the same lines as Mr. Bennett
and strongly supported his conten-
tions. The Select Committee idea
whereby careful consideration would
be given to the whole matter strongly
appealed to him. The placing of
Booths at the several places mention-
ed in the Bill for the eighteen electoral
district would entail an enormous
expenditure. Besides, it would be un-
wise to make such definite provision
in the Election Act, because in two
years from now there may not be any
people at Deer Lake and if they were
they may be permanent residents, and
if so they would have the privilege to
vote in the district in which they re-
sided. Some other points were men-
tioned by the Minister who built up
a strong argument against embarking
upon such a measure without giving
it the consideration it deserved. It
was too big a matter to take up hap-
hazardly at present. He therefore
supported the idea of careful con-
sideration by a Select Committee.**Messrs. Grimes, Hickman and Half-
yard** spoke briefly. The latter agreed
to a Select Committee provided a re-
port was made at the present ses-
sion.The House agreed to this and the
following Select Committee was ap-
pointed:—Prime Minister, Minister of
Justice, Colonial Secretary, Leader of
