#### ARMOUR STOCK OFFERING.

Comprises 750,000 Shares of Class A Common.

N.Y.—A syndicate headed by Blair & Co., Inc., is offering at \$23 a share 750,000 shares of Class A participating common stock of Armour & Co. of Illinois.

In connection with this offering it is announced that purchasers will have the privilege of subscribing for class B shares of the company at \$14 a share.

This is the first public offering of any common stock of Armour & Co. Both classes of stock are listed on Chicago Stock Exchange and New York Curb market. The offering represents part of stock already outstanding, and is not new financing by Armour & Co.

N.Y.—Books will open for subscription to Armour a common stock at 10 a.m. Thursday.

N.Y.—Armour & Co. declared two quarterly dividends of 50 cents on Class A common, one payable as of Jan. 2 to stock of record on that date and the other payable April 1 to stock of record March 14; also regular quarterly dividend of 1 1/2% on preferred of Armour & Co. of Illinois, Armour of Delaware and North American Provision Co., all payable April 1 to stock of record March 14. This is first dividend on Class A since January, 1921.

N.Y.—Pres. White of Armour says: "Inasmuch as the company's net profits in 1924 were \$18,300,000, of which \$9,000,000 was applicable to common,

and as 1925 earnings left some \$5,400,000 for common, directors deemed it proper to resume common dividends.

"This indicates extent of company's recovery from depression of 1922. Additional volume secured through purchase of Morris & Co. lessened unit costs, and made possible other economies which run into millions annually. Results are apparent in our improved financial condition."

#### ARMOUR & CO.

\$800,000,000 Gross in 1924—Satisfactory Outlook for 1925.

Boston—In connection with the offering of 750,000 shares of Armour & Co. Class A participating common stock (voting trust certificates) at \$22 per share Pres. F. Edson White writes Blair & Co., Inc. that 1924 sales were in excess of \$800,000,000, or about the same as in 1923.

In 1924 net earnings after taxes, charges and preferred dividends were \$3,016,249, equal to \$4.59 on the 2,000,000 Class A shares or \$2.25 per share on the combined 2,000,000 Class A and 2,000,000 Class B shares.

Mr. White says: "While the earnings for 1924 greatly exceeded those for the preceding year they do not, in my opinion, reflect the probable earning power of the business. Operations in the fertilizer and leather lines have been below normal for several years past, whereas these lines ordinarily are good profit makers and will, I feel sure, again become so. The facilities of the company and its subsidiaries are capable of handling even a larger volume of business and with a constantly growing domestic market due to increased population, we should get a fair share of new and profitable business annually."

"It is interesting to note that Armour & Co. and subsidiaries have some 80,500 stockholders and further that some 23,700 employees out of a total of 60,000 Armour employees have purchased approximately \$7,000,000 preferred stock."

"The offering of the Class A common stock voting trust certificates represents a part of the issue of Class A stock already outstanding and is not new financing by the company."

"The year 1925 opened under favorable circumstances. Our plants are all in good operating condition. Our inventories are normal in amount and are conservatively priced. The consumption of our products continues in large volume and all present conditions point to a continued satisfactory business."

Consolidated balance sheet as of Dec. 27, 1924, of Armour & Co., and subsidiaries shows current assets of \$205,732,531. These current assets include cash of \$15,265,571 and marketable securities of \$10,444,046. Current liabilities total \$61,709,758, of which notes payable represent \$37,267,536. Net working capital was therefore \$144,073,843.

## Padres of Toc H Seek Recruits to "Work With Men"

### ORGANIZATION NAMED AFTER BRILLIANT YOUNG BRITISHER KILLED IN 1915.

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—Rev. P. B. Clayton, who, with his co-worker, Rev. M. P. G. Leonard, is in New York City, on their world tour in the interests of the Society of Toc H, explained today the name, purpose and origin of this movement of Great Britain. Seen at the office of Sir Ashley Sparks, at Number 25 Broadway, Dr. Clayton said:

"Toc H was started in 1915 and named after a magnificent young leader, Gilbert Talbot, who might have been Prime Minister if he had lived. Talbot, youngest son of the Bishop of Winchester, was killed in July, 1915, and in December of that year a house was begun in his name to serve the needs of all men.

"At the top of this house, protruding on none, but dominating all, was our wonderful chapel. It was the most famous one of the war, made with their own hands by our men to commemorate their dead comrades. There all men met, high churchmen, Methodists, Baptists and Roman Catholics, who came there to say their own prayers—it was a splendid shrine.

"This Toc H is a religious movement, to be sure, but it is not denominational.

"The survivors of the home are not many. Perhaps 2,000 of the 250,000 men who visited it are left to us.

"The original fellowship is scattered. Yet in 1919 they decided not to create another of those veterans' societies that always look backward, rather to inaugurate a movement which should be the equivalent of 'scouting.' And also one that would be a challenge to young men of all classes—men of an older age than 'scouting' claims.

"Work With Men."

"It should draw its recruits from potential leaders in all areas of so-

ciety. From university men, from young business men, both employer and employee, and bring them together not to 'work for men' in a patronizing way, but to 'work with men.' Its basis should be a wide outlook, an unselfishness in conduct and definite jobs of service undertaken voluntarily as part of brother work, hospital and prison work—all kinds."

The lamp, symbol and award of the society, two of which he brought with him, were explained thus by "Padre" Clayton:

"The lamp is not for exhibition purposes. It is our symbol. These two have been brought along have been by two of our houses—one in Australia, the other in the Federated Malay States, to which we are carrying them. They have been won by these bodies of men who have attained 'branch' status. They are taken from the design of the old Greek catacomb lamp."

The Society of Toc H sets forth in its aims for men and its attitude toward them that:

"They are not asked to give up their political convictions, to forswear those opinions, to desert their class; they are only expected to do their little bit in helping the world along by self sacrifice, by unselfish humor, and by widening outlook.

"It is the first intention of Toc H to establish one great house in each great city, in which a number of youngsters can live in one happy brotherhood. Each house has its chaplain, who may be of any Christian denomination. Each room commemorates an older brother who fell in the war. The honorary warden has at his hand the branch 'job master' who finds jobs of service for members volunteering and sees that they do them."

The work in our Toc H's two principal 'padres' will include after their New York visit, Boston, Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, then New Zealand, Australia, Singapore and India.

The tunic is generally worn with a skirt, hung from a yoke, with gathered front fullness.

For sports, we note jumpers, blouses and plain and pleated skirts of a boyish character.
