GUIDE'S FATE IN BLIZZARD.

Casimir Pic, with his brother Aime, escorted the party of three tourists from Valtournanche up to Dufour peak, on Monte Rosa. Despite the threatening weather, the party then climbed the Zumstein peak. As the snow began to fall the guides tried to lead their charges to the Cabin Marguerite. The snow was so blinding that the guides lost all sense of direction.

Casimir Pic, who was in the lead, plunged into the chasm. The rope held, and Pic, suspended in mid-air, coolly gave orders to his brother to pull him out. The cord, however, was frozen, and broke at the first effort of the party to save the guide, and it was only with great difficulty that the tourists restrained Aime from throwing himself into the chasm.

Col. Freyberg's Gallant Swim

ACROSS CHANNEL—ALL BUT 600 YARDS — WIFE'S ADVICE TO STOP.

LA-Col. Bernard Cyril Freyberg, V.C., one of the outstanding figures of the Gallipoli campaign, failed, but failed gloriously, yesterday in an attempt to swim the English Channel. He abandoned his efforts after swimming for nearly 17 hours and reaching within about a quarter of a mile of the Kent coast.

Col. Freyberg left Cape Griznez, on the French side, at 8.20 p.m. on Tuesday. He swam with great vigour, using a left overarm stroke, changing occasionally to the breast stroke. In the tug which escorted him were his wife and a party of swimming friends. Several of his friends accompanied him in the water at intervals.

Col. Freyberg, who is a man of splendid physique, was exceedingly cheerful throughout the swim, laughing and joking with those in the tug and with the swimmers. Mrs. Freyberg had charge of the feeding arrangements.

He drew well out from Cape Griznez and with the turn of the tide fine progress was made across Channel. He got well up to the Varne Lightship about seven miles off the coast between Dover and Folkestone. Soon the cliffs west of Dover were sighted.

As Fit As Ever.

At daybreak Col. Freyberg seemed as fit as ever. His food consisted of egg and milk, beef tea and biscuits. He also had a little brandy in the later hours of the swim.

When the tug was about two miles off Dover a flotilla of motor boats went out with parties of swimmers, who cheered the colonel. Mr. Unwin, the Olympic swimming coach, who had been training Col. Freyberg, accompanied him from this point until the swim ended about one o'clock yesterday afternoon.

When within 600 yards of the coast the tide, which was sweeping out off the headland, caused Col. Freyberg to drift until he was a mile off shore.

"Can't I Stop In."

Col. Freyberg was advised to give up, but asked, "Can't I stop in?" Mrs. Freyberg did not think her husband should be allowed to put in the extra four hours' effort which would be needed to enable him to take advantage of the change of tide, and as there was a general feeling among the party that this was the current view he decided to come out.

He swam to the small boat, gripped the ladder, and was helped in.

A hearty cheer was given him as he got in the boat. The swim had lasted 16 hours, 40 minutes, and the distance covered, swim and drift, was about 35 miles.

Col. Freyberg afterwards went on board the tug Langdon, where he lay down until Dover was reached, when he was helped into a motor car and driven to the Grand Hotel.

"The Too Much For Me."

Last night Col. Freyberg said to the Daily Mail, Dover, correspondent: "I am naturally rather disappointed that I did not succeed after getting so near the shore, but the tide was too much for me. I had a splendid party of swimming friends on board the tug, and their company in the sea during the night was very encouraging. It was a pleasure to see the motor boats come out from Dover. My longest swim previously has
