"The Cabinet is at last completed, and some advance has been made even in what are called the subordinate appointments. The deficitive list will be found in another column. It certainly is sufficiently "strong",—if that be the right word—in Peers. The contemporary which has of late appointed itself to the henorary, though not very high, office of Poge to the House of Lords, may sing an even; ing song of thanksgiving as it recites the titled roll. To give Debrett his due, his sacred pages enshrine statesmen who would be eminent even if they were not grandees of the British Empire; but as we read the catalogue of titles, "Argyle, Clarendon, Granville, De Grey Kimberley, Hartingdon,"—the six Lords appointed to Cabinet offices—we are obliged to confess that most of them might have failed to prove themselves "leading men," if they had not been born Peers. The Commoners in the Cabinet are Messrs. Bright, Bruce, Cardwell, Childers, Fortescue, Goschen, and Lowe. Of Mr. Bright's claims it is needless to speak; and there can be no doubt that his presence is significant. We know that his acceptance of the Board of Trade, rather than a Secretaryship of State, is his own choice; yet many persons will believe that the post allotted to him is hardly wormhy of his reputation or just influence, and hardly commensurate with his past services and unabated political power. Still, he is a Cabinet Minister, and the advanced Liberalism of the time will be ably represented by him in the councils of our rulers. But when we name Mr. Bright, we name the only man in the new Cabinet who represents the Radical school. Mr Cardwell originally belonged to the Conserva-friendly belonged to the Conserva-friendly belonged to the Conservawe name Mr. Bright, we name the only man in the new Gabinet who represents the Radical school. Mr. Card well originally belonged to the Conservative side, being distinguished among the immediate followers of Peel; Mr. Childers, Mr. Goschen, and Mr. Bruce are most intelligent Liberals, but are not known as belonging to the "advanced" school.
