The Calgary city hockey team will not play this week, as it was impossible to have Strathcona down for Friday evening, but the north boys have promised to be in Calgary for Tuesday next.

Joe Mahaffy has just received a letter from his friend, Ike Rockenfield, who is under reserve with the St. Louis team. "Rocky" would like to play in the west, and if this was an outlaw league, he would take the first train for Edmonton—Bulletin.

Last night Dr. Ings gave a dinner to the champion Caledonia football team at his residence. After dinner a few songs and speeches were indulged in, and the evening settled down to cards. The singing of Auld Lang Syne ended a very pleasant evening.

Edmonton are arranging for Regina to send their hockey team to the north to play Edmonton and Strathcona. If Regina should take the trip, the locals will go after the Saskatchewan Capitals for a game at the auditorium.

The Basketball league in connection with the Y.M.C. which has been postponed through not being able to practice on account of the evangelistic services, will start again next week. The captains of the different teams will meet and draw up a new schedule.

Chas. Moth will undertake to throw two wrestlers named Stetter and Valeo on Saturday evening at Edmonton. Moth has undertaken to throw each man twice inside of an hour. Failing to do this he will pay one dollar a minute until he accomplishes the job.

Taylor, who was with Ottawa most of 1906 and finished the season with Houghton, has written Edmonton asking for terms and will likely be given a chance to show here. From newspaper reports he is a great hitter and a shortstop of good fielding ability.—Bulletin.

The Western Canada College clinched the intercollegiate hockey league last evening by winning from the business college by a score of seven to nil. The college boys were far too strong for their opponents, and but for the good work on the defence, a larger score would have been tallied against them.

The Winnipeg Tribune says that the Montreal Wanderers offered Russell Bowie, the Vics' crack player, one thousand dollars to turn out in the second game against the Kenora boys, but Bowie refused. This player leads the field in scoring, among the eastern players, having fourteen goals in three games to his credit.

Amos Huther, the latest outfielder signed by Edmonton, has a great "rep." He was with Beaumont in the Texas league last year and in 72 games batted 270. Beaumont's team has dropped out of league baseball, hence Manager White's luck in securing Amos. Last year in the Texas league, less than half a dozen players batted over 300.—Bulletin.

A special writer of the Medicine Hat Times in commenting upon the Cypress-Calgary intermediate game in Calgary falls into the same error as Rev. Dr. MacRae. The writer says: The Cypress boys went up to Calgary ten days ago, to play the

intermediates. Instead, three or four of the Calgary seniors were put on against them, as acknowledged in the Calgary papers. This may be all very good sport for the team that works the trick, but it is the kind of thing that gives sport the bad name it has. Seniors were available to the Cypress team, but they were never thought of.

Manager Thyme of the Calgary baseball club is doing good work in the far east and is beginning to get the fast ones for the team. He writes Secretary Kirby that he expects to have his team all signed in a few weeks.

The first player signed for the year was John Averhill, a right handed pitcher who is as good as are produced. He played with Haverhill of the New England league in 1905. Last year he played with the Lowell and Ashland teams. He made a good record with both teams. He weighs 175 lbs. and is 5 ft. 9 in. in height. He has great speed and has always made good wherever he has been. He is a very gentlemanly player both on and off the field. His home is in Lynn, Mass.

The second player to sign with the Calgary team was James Wholley, a strong second baseman from Haverhill, Mass., who guarded second base for Grand Rapids one season under the leadership of John Ganzel, one of the greatest baseball leaders of the day. Last season he made a remarkable record for the Laconia, New Hampshire state league, getting .318 against the best slab performers in that league. He fielded .986. He is a very speedy base runner, purloining 48 of them during the season.

Among other first class players who are desirous of playing under Manager Thyme are Catcher Montgomery of Wakefield, Mass.; Kailley, who caught for Fall River, New England state league, last season; Driscoll, of Somerville, Mass., who has been the receiver for Winthrop in the Maine state league, where he made a good showing. He is six feet tall and weighs 180 lbs. He will without doubt be found upon the Calgary team.

Mr. Thyme is receiving applications every day by the score from good men. He is picking out the best of them.

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 30—Burns defeated Chas. Hackenschmidt at wrestling tonight. Burns won the first contest, catch-as-can in 24 minutes. Hackenschmidt took the second, Gracie-Roman in 31 minutes, and Burns the third, catch-as-can in 24 minutes.

Saranac Lake, N.Y., Jan. 30—Four thousand persons today witnessed the starting races at the Pontiac club. Morris Wood of the Saranac skating club won all his heats. In the three mile event, however, Logan of the Varona Lake skating club pressed him closely. All the amateur events were run in heats. In the three mile professional, Sinnirud fell just as he was catching Norval Baptie.

Boston, Jan. 30—The first international contest between German and American yachts in German waters will be next August, when another series of the so-called "Sonder" type will be sailed at Kiel for a cup offered by the emperor.

Arrangements for the races were perfected today by an interchange of cables between Rear Admiral Ransford of the Imperial Yacht Club, and Henry Howard, chairman of the German-American race committee of the Eastern Yacht club of this city. The races will begin on August 15 and the United States will be represented by three yachts which will be selected by the German-American race committee. The races will be practically a return of

those held last summer at Marblehead, when the American yacht Vim won the trophy.

The only change in the conditions is that the crews must be all amateurs. Last year one yacht had a paid hand to assist in sail handling.

It is understood that the trial races for the American boats will be held at Marblehead in June, and that quite a delegation of American yachtsmen, besides the nine men constituting the crews of the three yachts, and the race committee will go to Kiel.

Notice is hereby given that the City of Calgary will apply at the next session of the Legislature of the Province of Alberta for amendments to its ordinance and charter for power.

1. To extend the limits of the city so as to include:

- A. That portion of Sec. 17 north of Bow River.
- The south half of Sec. 20.
- The south half of Sec. 21.
- That portion of section 16 north of Bow River.
- That portion of section 17 south of Bow River.
- The north half of Sec. 8.
- The north half of Sec. 9.
- The north-west quarter of Sec. 10.
- That portion of the south-west quarter of Sec. 10 north of Elbow River.
- The north-east and south-east quarter of Sec. 10.
- Section 11.
- That portion of section 13 west of eastern bank of Bow River.
- That portion of section 13 west of Bow River, and to make an assessment and collection roll for the part so taken in for the balance of the year.

The south half of section 8.

The north half of section 5.

The south half of section 9.

That portion of the north half of section 4 north of Elbow River.

The south west quarter of section 10.

The south half of section 22.

The south half of section 23.

That portion of section 14 lying north of the Bow River all in Township 24, Range 1, west of 5th.

2. To provide that the Poll tax shall only be collected from those who have resided within the city for at least thirty days and who are between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years and who are not already tenants paying rent.

3. To provide in cases of persons declaring that they are unable to pay the cost of the same that the city may continue water and sewer connections from the city line to the cellar line, and charge such cost against the property, to be payable in three yearly instalments, and make the necessary financial arrangements for the same.

4. To provide for the making of the voters lists within three months from the confirmation of the assessment each year and that a copy be posted up in the city hall and at least four other places to be designated by the Council.

5. To provide for the assessment, rating and taxing of all real estate belonging to the city and levying water rates and charging electric light bills against the same.

6. To provide that in all cases of improvements local or otherwise that where the city is to pay any proportion thereof that a By-law authorizing the same to be previously submitted to the electors.

7. To provide that on a By-law approved of by the electors the term of office of Aldermen may be extended to two years.

8. To provide for the legalizing of and validating the By-law 678 respecting the floating debt and the issue of bonds thereunder and also of By-law 670 and the bonds issued thereunder.

9. To provide for the submission of the assessment roll to a committee of the Council of not less than four for examination and report and for the Council equalizing, raising or lowering the assessment or any portion thereof without the formality of a complaint.

10. To provide that in elections for Aldermen no ballot shall be counted unless it discloses a bona fide vote or mark in favor of as many candidates as there are vacancies.

11. To provide that the Returning Officer at election shall appoint Deputy Returning Officer and select Polling Booths.

12. That Council have power to compel the erection of buildings in certain areas to be erected ten feet from the street line.

13. To provide for making supplementary assessment and collector's Roll to include persons coming to the City or starting business after the Assessment Appeal Court has confirmed the original Roll.

Amendment to Charter

14. To amend Charter fixing the date of the first meeting of council to be held on the first legal day of each year.

15. To establish, install, maintain, develop and operate a telephone.
