their enthusiastic reception to their highnesses, and concluded with the hope that the visit would hasten the day of "One fleet, one throne, one empire."

In similarly brief fashion, Mayor Mitchell then expressed on behalf of the citizens of Calgary their pleasure in the visit of the vice-regal party, and hoping that there would be occasion for other visits in the future.

His Highness then replied briefly, declaring that on behalf of the Duchess and the Princess, he could say that they had thoroughly enjoyed their reception in Calgary, and the entertainment that had been given them. He alluded smilingly to the beautiful weather of yesterday, pointing out that it more than compensated for the rain of the preceding day when the party arrived.

Rousing Cheers Given.

At the conclusion of his remarks, ladies and gentlemen all joined in three rousing cheers for their Royal Highnesses, concluding with a "tiger" that was echoed by the big crowds in the street.

At the Stampede grounds the Duke took occasion to express his high appreciation for the entertainment that had been provided, and his enthusiasm waxed warm when, just after inspecting the mounted police veterans, the boy scouts, and the gorgeous Indian parade, he shook hands with Mayor Mitchell and Alderman Whaley, chairman of the entertainment committee and expressed himself in glowing terms.

"This is excellent," said he. "I have never seen a better body of Indians. They are all splendid specimens despite their age. I assure you we appreciate everything and more especially the western features which are such a novelty to the Duchess, the Princess and myself."

Display of Democracy.

The spectacle which greeted the royal party as it emerged from the horse show building where the veterans had been inspected, was one of the most democratic and popular of the old chieftains in their most treasured suits, immense feathered head-dresses and daintily painted, stalwart warriors as straight as an arrow and as lithe as a willow, sat their mounts and at donhome as they passed the royal party. The coachman was ordered to drive to the royal box overlooking the Stampede grounds, but the governor-general displayed his cordial democracy by ordering him to draw to one side and not through the parade. From this vantage point the Duke drank in the splendor of the spectacle which prompted his hearty appreciation as expressed to Mayor Mitchell and Alderman Whaley.

Princess Snapshots Indiana.

Princess Patricia, whose girlish enthusiasm has won her the title of the "unconventional princess," revelled in the spirit of the moment and grasping her camera stood and amused herself by making snapshots of the Indians, all the while her wistful smile and sly laughter mingling with the guttural "Howas" of the stolid redmen. The royal party entered the box while the steeple rising was in progress, several men having popped already without the public being either informed as to who they were or what time they consumed in roving, and time.

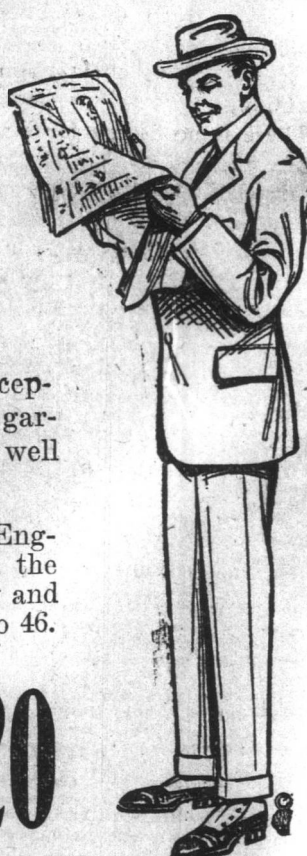

That the royal party is gaining the fullest measure of enjoyment out of the entertainment was undisputed shortly after entering the box set aside for them.

Joe Gardiner had just set the fastest mark of the day by roping and tying a steer in 27 4-5 seconds. Several other ropers had tried, but remained outside the minute mark. Then Ed Echols drew a fleet steer that headed directly for the royal box. Cowboys were saddling bucking horses in the vicinity and the steer came for the group at full speed. Echols close behind. He roped just as the steer was opposite and within another hundred feet piled it and tied it, completing in 29 seconds. POLICE HAVE A CLUE TO MUGUCKIN MURDER

Boy of 15 Arrested on His Own Statement That He Murdered Woman

Edmonton, Sept. 6.—That the mounted police are holding a boy of 15 years on the belief that they will be able to uncover something which will solve the mystery of the Maguckin murder, that they are working on the boy's own statement to a companion that he killed a woman, that the boy may have been incited to such a crime by reading dime novels and looking at lurid picture shows, and that so far as the mounted police are concerned Adams' theory has been absolutely abandoned and a theory that the crime was committed by a juvenile, substituted, is the startling news which leaked out from the deep recesses of the mounted police service yesterday.

About a week ago, a mere boy, said to be only 15 years of age, was arrested by the mounted police. A charge of horse-stealing was laid against him, but beneath and behind it all the police evidently believe the boy has some connection with the mysterious murder of Mrs. Maguckin.

Although continual questions have been asked at mounted police headquarters, the officials have maintained an imperturbable silence, and those in touch with the case were led to believe that the Maguckin murder had developed into a great mystery, but through the gossiping of two neighboring women the following facts have come to light.

A few days after the murder, the youth who now lies incarcerated in the mounted police barracks, in a moment of bravado confidence, told a companion that he had murdered a woman in City Park Annex. He had been reading literature of the "Diamond Duck" nature, and thrilled by this and pictures of gun-waving men in local picture shows he may have been led to do the terrible deed.

New York, Sept. 5.—Miss Alpine Blitch, weight 600 pounds, was married in Brooklyn to Louis H. Aiken, weight 136 pounds, by Alderman Jesse Moore and James Martineau, who weigh 300 pounds each. The bride, who wore 36 yards of pale blue silk for a dress and a 14-inch bracelet, was supplied with the groom with a wedding ring of the size of a sapling ring.

GREAT NORTHERN PREPARED TO BUILD Program of Company in Connection With Its British Columbia Extensions

Vancouver, Sept. 6.—"We are prepared to build a single line of track from the summit of Hope mountain down the western slope to Hope, and to give the Kettle valley line equal running rights over it, or to allow the Kettle valley line to construct the road and give us truckage facilities. This matter, I expect, will soon be amicably settled. The Great Northern will shortly award a contract for the construction of a 45-mile extension of the V. Y. & E. line from Coalmont on the Tulameen river westward to the summit of the Hope mountains. This work will be rushed."

This was the definite announcement of the G. N. R. policy in British Columbia made to The Times today by Mr. L. G. Gilman, assistant to the president of the Hill system. Mr. Gilman added that one single line of railway over the western slope of the Hope range down the Coquella river would involve a heavy expenditure, and while serving the purpose of the two railways concerned, would not yield any substantial return for a considerable time. Mr. Gilman came up from Seattle today with Mr. M. J. Costello, traffic manager of Western lines, on official business.
