## HOUSEHOLD RECIPES.

### Boiled Salad Dressing.

Put into a teacup one tablespoon mustard, one tablespoon sugar, one tablespoon salt, and mix thoroughly. Pour over this oil until the cup is two-thirds full. Beat slightly three eggs in a saucepan and pour the mixture in the cup into the beaten eggs. Beat smooth and add one cup milk and two tablespoons vinegar. Cook over hot water or in a double boiler.

### Ginger Snaps.

Boil together one cup lard (or half lard and half butter), one cup syrup, and one cup brown sugar. While still hot, add two cups flour. Dissolve three teaspoons soda in one tablespoon of vinegar. Add to syrup when cold. Stir in one well-beaten egg and one tablespoon each ginger, cinnamon and allspice. Make very stiff dough, adding a little cornstarch. This quantity will require three cups of flour or a little more.

### Lemon Pie.

Cook together for fifteen minutes in double boiler one cup milk, one cup syrup, one tablespoon cornstarch, the yolks of three eggs, white of one, grated rind and juice of one lemon and saltspoon salt. Fill the paste while hot and bake in quick oven. Remove from oven and cover with meringue made from the whites of the other two eggs. Return to oven long enough to brown.

### Apple Float.

Whites of three eggs, beaten very stiff. Sweeten with four large spoons of sugar, add one pint stewed and sifted apple, and beat until stiff enough to stand alone. Fill a dish with whipped cream or custard, and pour apple over. This is delicious if chilled thoroughly, and served with smoked cookies.

### Creamed Apple Tart.

Allow three-fourths cup syrup to one and one-half pints cut apples, and grated rind of a lemon and juice of one-half. Put into a pudding dish, cover with rich crust, and bake a good brown, and till apples are cooked thoroughly. Remove crust carefully without breaking and pour upon the apples one pint boiled custard made with cornstarch. Set away to become ice cold.

### Chocolate Pudding.

Melt together one tablespoon butter, one cup syrup, two squares chocolate. Add two cups flour, sifted together with two teaspoons baking powder, one cup milk, two well-beaten eggs. Beat thoroughly and steam two hours. Serve with hard sauce, whipped cream, or syrup and cream.

### How to Exterminate Red Ants.

Grease a plate with lard, and set it where the insects abound. They prefer lard to anything else, and will forsake sugar for it. Place a few sticks around the plate for the ants to climb up on. Occasionally turn the plate bottom up over the fire, and the ants will fall in with the melting lard. Reset the plate, and in a short time you will catch them all. Powdered borax, sprinkled around the infested places, will exterminate both red and black ants.

## THE DISTRIBUTION OF SOCKS TO THE SOLDIERS.

## BUSY TIME FOR WESTERN ONTARIO HALF-MILE TRACKS

St. Thomas, April 18.—Mr. Geo. S. McColl, secretary of the Canadian Trotting Circuit, states that, commencing with the Dufferin Park races on June 1, he expects the circuit will continue through nearly the whole season.

Dufferin will be followed by Hillcrest, then to St. Thomas. Aylmer will come next, then to Tillsonburg, with London and Chatham following.

The circuit managers are now negotiating with Seaforth, Stratford, Galt, Woodstock, and other Ontario towns to give race meetings, and afterwards back to St. Thomas and Aylmer. In this way the circuit managers expect to carry their racing up to the date of the London Fair, where there will be five days' racing.

At none of the meetings will there be any early closing stakes, and at all the meetings there will be \$400 purses, so the horsemen will have lots of money to race for.

It is pleasant to note that the managers of the Canadian Trotting Circuit are endeavoring to extend the size of their circuit and to take in all the principal towns and cities in Western Ontario, so that racing may be continued from the opening at Dufferin to Hillcrest right up to the commencement of the fall exhibitions and fairs.

No doubt there will be a great deal of racing in Eastern and Central Ontario by individual towns and cities, but we believe that the formation of a circuit or even two circuits would be greatly to the advantage of the race meetings, the horsemen and the horse industry.

Having mentioned this matter before, it is reiterated in the hope that some action may be taken at an early date to get into shape a circuit organization in the eastern part of the province, the same as is in operation now in the western part of the province.

Rev. Dr. A. T. Sowerby, a former pastor of the Aylmer Baptist Church, has been called to the pastorate of the Dovercourt Road Baptist Church, Toronto. He has agreed to accept the call, which was unanimous, and will take up his pastoral duties there on May 8.
