

Treublesome Milk Law.

The Dairy Commissioner of New York State has apparently aroused a hornet's nest by prosecuting a Jefferson county farmer for selling milk that did not come up to the legal standard. The farmer was not unknown, but had long borne a reputation for the strictest integrity. Naturally the prosecution was commonly regarded as in the nature of persecution. Now a petition, numerously signed by farmers of Jefferson county and indorsed by the County Grange, has passed resolutions repudiating the Dairy Commission in all its parts, and asking that the Legislature discontinue the appropriation of \$50,000 per year, which he uses in giving instruction to farmers in dairy matters.
