Edim Pasha Feeling the Greek Position at Pharsala.

Greece Seems to Have Given Up the Game in Crete - Contradictory Statements as to the Continuance of the Struggle.

London, May 5 .- The difficulty of saying what has actually occurred at the seat of war continues. But the presumption is that Edhem Pasha is merely feeling the Greek position at Pharsala, preparatory to delivering a general attack. Edhem Pasha's repeated assaults on the wings of the Greek formation have probably had the object of compelling Prince Constantine to send them reinforcements and thus veaken his center at Pharsala. We may soon, therefore, expect to hear that Edhem has struck hard at this

weakened point. f Col. Vassos can only be regarded as making for peace, and is, apparently, the first step in that direction. Greece may thus regain the friendship of the powers, which have always stipulated this amend before using their good offices at Constantinople. The appointment of a successor to Col. Vassos is probably only a blind to allay popular feeling.

TALK OF PEACE. An Athens dispatch to Il Corrière Delta Sera, of Milan, says Garibaldi has had a long conference with King George, who seemed more preoccupied with his position in the yes of the powers than with the war. His Majesty, it appears, was in excellent humor. Continuing, the dispatch asserts that M. Ralli, the Greek Premier, after suggesting that Ricotti Garibaldi should enroll Greeks among the Italian volunteers, now requests nim to suspend the enrollment of Italians, leading to the belief that secret negotiations to end the war are prowas born in Paris in 1828.

A dispatch to the Daily Chronicle from Pharsala, dated Monday, says it is rumored in the Greek camp that peace will shortly be proclaimed. The Athens correspondent of the Daily Mail says that the Ministers of War and the Interior have returned from Pharsala and made their report to the Cabinet. It is understood that as the result of their inquiry the war will be discontinued.

WAR TALK. London, May 5.-The Athens correnet sat till daybreak on Tuesday, hearing the reports of the ministers from the front, and finally resolved to coninue the war. Gen. Smolenski has declined to accept the post of chief of staff of the crown prince, as he pre fers to remain with his own brigade The decision of the Government is nomentous, but is is difficult to say whether it is absolutely final.

INTERVENTION. The Athens correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says that the foreign ministers have tendered the intervention of the powers to Greece, but the Government has reserved its reply. NEUTRALITY.

London, May 5 .- A royal proclamation was gazetted last evening, en-joining upon all British subject strict neutrality in the war between Turkey The Parliamentary secretary for

the Foreign Office, Geo. N. Curzon, in ! the House of Commons, replying to a question, said commu ications on the subject of mediation were continually passing between the powers, who earnestly desire to see the war between Greece and Turkey ended. "But." he added, "the first essential to successful mediation is evidence that the belligerents are prepared to accept it." Regarding Crete, Mr. Curzon said the powers intended to carry out the project of autonomy, but the continued presence of the Greek troops and the consequent attitude of the Christian Cretans rendered progress very difficult.
