TORONTO, July 31—11 p.m.—Tonight the pressure is lowest over Eastern Ontario and Alberta, and highest over Nova Scotia and Manitoba. Thunder showers have occurred in parts of Ontario to-day. Elsewhere in the Dominion the weather has been fine. Very high temperature prevails in the Northwest Territories. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 52°—70°; Calgary, 44°—90°; Battleford, 52°—90°; Prince Albert, 44°—88°; Qu'Appelle, 52°—86°; Winnipeg, 52°—79°; Toronto, 58°—75°; Montreal, 62°—82°; Quebec, 60°—74°; Halifax, 52°—70°.

—Messrs. Walter Gard and Edward Parker, city, are on a trip to the Mackinac.

—Miss Maude Parker, daughter of Mr. T. R. Parker, C. P. R. ticket agent, is visiting in Detroit.

—Misses Jessie McClellan and Edith Gustin have returned from Port Stanley. They visited a short time in Cleveland.

—Miss Maud Coughlin and Miss Ella Johnston, of Guelph, are spending a short vacation with friends in this city.

—Rev. Dr. Moment, of Brooklyn, N. Y., preached with eloquence and acceptance Sunday in Victoria Hall. Dr. Moment is the guest of Dr. Hodge.

—Among the newly arrived guests at the Fraser House, Port Stanley, are: Mrs. Taylor and daughter, Akron, Ohio; Frank Cooper, wife and family, this city; Thomas Colley and Mrs. Colley, Robert Burns, Mrs. Burns and child.

—Miss A. E. Martin is spending a few weeks with friends in London and Detroit.

—Mrs. Nicholson, of London, who has been visiting friends in Hamilton, has returned home.

—Miss Wilson, John street north, is visiting Mrs. Durand, London.—(Hamilton Herald.)

—Mr. John Watson, whose box factory was destroyed by fire on Saturday night has resumed business in the building formerly occupied by him at 470 York street.

—Intention is to build on the old site, but he has not arrived at any decided conclusion. Much sympathy is felt for him in his loss.

—Mr. Max Goldberg has entered suit against Contractor Heaman for \$5,000. He claims that while driving down Wellington street he was following him when he ran over a pile of gravel and upset, throwing him out on the road. The gravel was placed there by Mr. Heaman in front of a store which he is building for Johnston Bros., bakers.

—A Winnipeg dispatch to the Toronto Empire says: "The town of Rosthern is a fever of excitement over what has turned out to be an unfounded charge against the school teacher there, Miss Dunkin. The charge was made by Rev. Leo Gaez, and the residents are so incensed at his conduct in the matter that they have burned in effigy last night." What could our former fellow-townsmen have said to cause all this hubbub?

—In the case of Dr. Patterson, of Lucknow, charged with practicing dentistry without a license (which has interested the dental fraternity generally), Myer Parker, after due consideration of the evidence adduced, has decided that the defendant is guilty of a breach of the dental law and has therefore convicted him in the sum of \$20 and costs. His worship considers that the defendant was practicing dentistry and did not draw any line between the mechanical and professional features which go to make up the art of dentistry.

—The death is chronicled in Grand Lodge, Mich., of Mrs. Jane Nixon. Deceased was a daughter of the late Robert Jackson, of London township. She was born in Armagh, Ireland, in 1815, and came to Canada when 4 years old with her father, who settled in London township. She was married to John Nixon in 1833 and moved to Grand Lodge, Mich., in 1841, where she died at 78 years of age. Deceased was a member of the Methodist Church for 63 years and was a sister of Mrs. George Webster and Mr. Joshua Jackson, city.

—Quite an extended docket was placed before Magistrate Parks in the Police Court yesterday morning. Very few of the cases, however, were dealt with. James Kelly and Richard Porter, the two men who are said to have indulged, along with "Joker" Cavanagh, in the ransacking of Mrs. Esther Barnes' house, were charged with assault and wounding. The latter could not appear and the two were remanded for a week. Thomas Murray, who was an unwilling participant in the fracas, has also sworn out an information against the men.

Burglars at Delaware.

The store of Bolkin & Co., at Delaware, was entered by burglars on Friday night. Entrance was effected by means of a rear door and the necessary tools were procured from a near-by carpenter shop. A hole was drilled in the safe and about half a pound of powder placed therein, when, it appears, the burglars found the key and opened it without further trouble. About \$15 in small change was all they got and a few articles were taken out of the shop. The back door was double locked, and considerable trouble must have been experienced in forcing an entrance. The tools taken from the carpenter shop were left behind. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the robbery.

Walking to Chicago.

Two enterprising young residents of London, West, are intended to wait for cheap World's Fair rates, but purpose starting for Chicago to-day on foot. Harry Dell and Hubert Feekings are their names. They have shipped their Sunday clothes on ahead, and will travel with a limited amount of luggage, the necessary cash and shillings large enough to menace stray dogs or traps. They expect, if walking is fairly good, to cover the distance in

about fifteen days. The method of locomotion may be slower than a railroad train, but they are in no hurry, and expect to have a pleasant, healthful ramble through Ontario, Michigan and northern Indiana.

Fell Off the Bridge.

Ever since the construction of the C. P. R. railway bridge over the river at Oxford street, a certain class of young boys have made it the main object of life to perform daring feats thereon and see how near they can come to killing themselves and yet escape. Signs tacked up by the railway company warning pedestrians with the infliction of a heavy penalty appeared to have no effect on the boys. There was the usual number performing fancy drill on the bridge Sunday night. One of them, a boy named Chapman, residing on Ash street, was walking on the extreme edge of the frame-work. Suddenly his feet slipped and he fell head first into the water below. His companions thought he was killed and became very much scared. They hurried down and inquired what they could do for him. For a long time he could not stir, but at last he got on his feet, and by means of frequent rests and a well-developed limp he was able to get home. There is a splendid moral in this for other boys who indulge in this dangerous pastime. If the accident had happened further out and had the lad dropped onto a boulder or into the water there would probably have been a funeral as a result.

A Burglary That Failed.

Mr. Ed. Kidner, who resides at 499 Grey street, is engineer out at the London and Petrols Barrel Company, and, with his wife, attended the picnic of that firm at Port Stanley on Saturday. That they were absent appears to have been known by one of the light-fingered gentry who infest the city at this season and who are always looking out for chances. When Mr. and Mrs. Kidner returned home on Saturday night they found the inside of the house in a topsy-turvy condition. Bureau drawers were pulled out and their contents scattered around, bedclothes and bedcovers were piled all over, and almost everything movable had been examined by burglars in their search for money. At present nothing has been missed, and as the burglars overlooked what money there was in the house, it is believed that they went unwarded for their trouble. None of the neighbors appear to have seen anyone enter the house. People living next door saw the back door open about tea-time, but thought nothing of it. Mrs. Kidner's sister saw a man about the same time apparently waiting on the front sidewalk. Whoever they were, the parties locked the door after them when they left. Suspicion points to some young men who work not, and who infest the southern part of the city and the L. and P. track.
