

Two shots were exchanged, Wright being slightly wounded by the second. Before a third could be fired the chief of police arrived and interfered, the bout being declared off. The distance was ten paces, 38-calibre revolvers. The trouble grew out of a newspaper controversy over the fail-ure of the Rosedale Bank. KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS.

Dissection Begun The Merits of

China Is Under Way,

Lays a High Member of the Chinese Foreign Office.

Uprising in China-Rebels Preparing to Attack Canton.

The Khalifa Has Been Placing Torpedoes in the Nile.

Steps Taken to Still Further Increase Anglo-Canadian Trade - New Zealand Favors the Pacific Cable Scheme-No News of Andree.

CARVING UP CHINA. Pekin, Aug. 31.-A high member of the Tsung Li Yamen (Chinese Foreign Office), who is a British sympathizer, complained, in the course of a recent interview, that Great Britain's assurances of support against Russian aggression were belated. "Why." said this functionary, "without such a declaration until Russia had secured Port Arthur and France obtained concessions in the south? The disintegration of the empire has begun, and today the necessity for strong action is less urgent than when Russia first obtained a foothold." He admitted that China had broken her promises to England, but this, he argued, was because Russian pressure was too strong to be resisted. He complained of "British ignorance of Russia's line of action," and asked: "Why does not England approach Russia directly with a declaration that Russia's interference in China will be regarded as a casus belli? It is useless to punish helpless China and to participate in the disintegration of the empire. The Tsung Li Yamen prefers that British influence should be paramount, but it is unable to do anything unless Eng-

land helps with sword in hand." UPRISING IN CHINA. Hong Kong, Aug. 31.-The Kwang-Si rebellion, which has been quiescent for some time, shows signs of serious recrudescence. The rebels are in great force just northwest of Canton. preparing to attack the city. Tan, the viceroy of Liang-Kwang, has protested against the surrender of Kwang-Chow to the French, and when the Tsung Li Yamen (Chinese Foreign Office) insisted upon the surrender, Tan forwarded his resignation to Pekin, and handed his seals to the viceroy of Kwang-Tung. The viceroy of Canton having failed to suppress the rebellion in Hainan and protect the American missionaries, the United States consul at Canton has made strong representations to the acting viceroy, reiterating his demand for the prompt suppression of the general dis-The uprisings appear to turbances. have been fomented by the Triad and White Lily societies. which have combined for the urpose.

SEWING MACHINE TRUST. London Aug 31 -The St James Gazette this afternoon says it is reported on the Stock Exchange that Anglo-American Trust to control the output and sale of sewing machine, knitting machine, and all other kinds of needles is being formed. Several American and two Midland firms are reported to have sold their businesses to the combination. The capital, it is announced, will be £1,500,000, divided into preferred and ordinary stock.

GOVERNMENT OF SAMOA Aukland, N. Z., Aug. 31.-King Malietoa having died, the administration of government is being supervised by the three consuls, L. Osborne, repre-senting the United States; T. B. Cusack-Smith, representing England, and F. Rose, representing Germany, with the chief justice. Wm. Chambers, acting as president of the supervisory continue in force until the successor of the deceased knig has been chosen.

MYSTERIOUS THEFT. London, Aug. 31.-The police are investigating a mysterious robbery. A short time ago the postal authorities printed a new issue of postage and revenue stamps for one of the British Central African States, which were consigned to the governor of the state, who, however, never received them, they having completely disappeared. The face value of the stamps is \$5,000. Pending the investigation of the police the whole issue has been cancelled.

TORPEDOES IN THE NILE Cairo, Aug. 31.-The Khalifa, according to a dispatch received from Wad El Obelid, has laid torpedoes in the Nile below Omdurman, and a large dervish force is issuing from Kerreri, about eight miles north of Omdurman, to meet the Anglo-Egyptian advance. The Peninsular and Oriental Company's steamer Isis, recently built, has made a remarkable record in the fourney from London to Egypt. THE CZAR'S SCHEME. The Cleopatra put eighteen bluejack-ets on board the schooner, in an effort to save that vessel, but she foundered so suddenly that six of the bluejackets were drowned.

SPANISH SUPREMACY NOT WANTED. London, Aug. 31.-The Manila correspondent of the Times says: leading commercial men here have signed a memorial to Lord Salisbury, urging him to use his influence to prevent the Spaniards from regaining su-

premacy in the Philippines. "The conduct of the American troops is admirable. The town, since their occupation, has been wonderfully free from disturbance. General Greene has been ordered to return to Washington. He will sail with General

Merritt. BUSCH'S BOOK ON BISMARCK. Berlin, Aug. 31.-Herr Morritz Busch's book on Bismarck, published today, contains a severe attack upon the late Emperor Frederick. Referring to Bismarck's memoirs, the author says: "Bismarck was able to make history, but he lacked the qualities necessary to write it. These defects were supplied by Lothar Bucher; but, as he died before the work could be finished, it remains incomplete, though still a work of many-sided interest and much value."

ANGLO-CANADIAN TRADE-NEW

MAIL ROUTE. London, Aug. 31.-The Bristol Chamber of Commerce will take advantage of the presence in Britain of Canadians and other colonials attending the meeting of the British Association to hold a conference, at which business men may discuss the question of the improvement of trade between Great Britain and her colonies. The new mail route between Great Britain and Canada, via Avonmouth,

is to be utilized for the first time on

London, Aug. 31.-At the trade union congress at Bristol yesterday, Mr.Dun-can, one of the American delegates, referring to the growth of political understanding between England and the United States, asked why American and British workmen should not co-operate to defy the introduction from any other nation of "anything calculated to be unfair to the interests of the working classes." Mr. Lloyd, another American delegate, said he would never rest satisfied until the, had a

parliament of the world's workers, where international industrial questions could be discussed. The trades union congress unanimously passed a resolution expressing satisfaction at the czar's peace note, and calling on the British Government to give effect thereto, "as militarism is the great foe of liberty, and is a crushing burden to the toiling millions."

BOOMING THE PACIFIC CABLE. Wellington, New Zealand, Aug. 31 .-The report of the committee of the legislature just issued, recommends joining the Australian colonies with Canada and the mother country by a Pacific cable, on the basis that if Great Britain and Canada together would guarantee five-ninths of the cost of the work, New Zealand and the other colonies would contribute to the remaining four-ninths, of which amount New Zealand will contribute one-ninth. The committee also recommends that Canada be intrusted with the construction. administration and maintenance. the understading that the contribution colonies are to be entitled to representation and votes on matters of policy of the management, and that the cable committee—an arrangement that will is to be fointly owned and controlled by the contributors. The report concludes with advising that a conference of the colonies concerned in the new cable be held in New York
