10. Inspection of Lodge Charters.—It is the conclusion of the congress that a visitor to a lodge has no right to demand an inspection of the lodge charter.

It will be observed by reference to the grand secretary's report, that a very considerable number of lodge bylaws and amendments of bylaws were submitted to me during the year for approval. Attention was called by me last year, as had been frequently done by my predecessors, want of due formality in the submission of bylaws, but there has been no noticeable improvement. Probably there never will be.

Again I refrain from submitting Grand Lodge any of my rulings during the past year. It does not seem to me that any of them have been of sufficient importance to go on record. In the majority of cases the points referred to me could have been dealt with by the district deputy grand masters. In a few instances masterly inactivity has been demonstrated, but in such cases I have remedied the situation by such means as I have sought. A little time for reflection led to brethren who appear to be "spilling a fight" over practically nothing, instead of promptly coming down with an abrupt decision in favor of one and against the other. I am sure that you will not in any way result in the passing entire away of necessity for any deliverance.

DISPENSATION.

On March 29 last a dispensation issued for a new lodge at Hanover, known as Hanover Lodge. The petition was introduced by Saugeen Lodge, No. 1 of Walkerton, and recommended by D.D.G.M. The new lodge will simply occupy territory formerly covered by a lodge of the same name at the same place whose warrant was surrendered on September 1, 1906.
