"It is," says the grand master, "gratifying to observe the continuance of a disposition on the part of our lodges to secure more attractive and comfortable rooms."

VISITATIONS. The grand master refers in detail to his visitation to lodges in various central localitits. Of his visit to London he says: "In response to repeated invitations, I visited the London brethren on Feb. 6 last, and was received by an immensely large gathering of the fraternity. A flattering address was presented and every courtesy and attention paid me which the extreme of thoughtfulness could suggest. After the conclusion of the proceedings in the lodge room a very enjoyable concert and ball were participated in by the brethren and their lady friends."

MASONIC CONGRESS . The congress assembled on Aug. 14 in the consistory rooms of the Scottish Rite, on the eighteenth floor of the great assured brethren, my appreciation of your Masonic Temple. Thirty-six grand jurisdictions were represented. M. W. Bro. Monroe C. Crawford, grand master of Illinois, was by acclamation elected president of the congress, and presided over its deliberations with marked ability, while \$18,991 15, and the expenditure \$16,478 26. your grand master was honored by unanimous election as one of the vice-presidents.

The following are the conclusions as adopted: 1. Grand Lodge Sovereignty .- The conclusion of the congress is that a grand lodge duly organized in a State or other autonomous territory is rightfully possessed of absolute Masonic sovereignty therein.

2. A Plea for Improved Proceedings .-The conclusion of the congress is that the formation of Masonic libraries should be encouraged and fostered, and inasmuch as the published proceedings of our grand lodges and other Masonic bodies do and ever will constitute the larger part of such libraries, greater care and more pains should be bestowed upon the preparation and publication of such proceedings, to the end that they may have greater value in every Masonic collection, and that there should be a freer and more generous distribution of proceedings among the brethren, to the end that Masonic light

may be more generally diffused. 3. Grand Representatives .- It is the conclusion of the congress that under the changed condition of selecting grand representatives too little time has elapsed to give opportunity for definite judgment as to the usefulness of the system, and it

should therefore be continued. 4. The Prerogatives of Grand Master .-It is the conclusion of the congress that the dispensing power recognized by the old regulations as residing in the person and office of grand master, has been so generally exercised by that officer from the organization of Masonry on the Grand Lodge system down to the present time that its existence cannot successfully be denied, but that there are no dispensing powers so residing that may not be limited or wholly denied by the Grand Lodge, save such as inhere in that office under the

sanctions of the ancient landmarks. 5. The Ancient Landmarks. - The conclusion of the congress is that the ancient landmarks are those fundamental principles which characterize Masonry as defined by the charges of a Freemason, and without which the institution cannot be identified as Masonry, combined with the essentials of the unwritten language by which brethren distinguish each other as Masons. 6. The Creed of a Mason .- An unequivocal belief and trust in God is the fundamental principle upon which the institution of Freemasonry was founded and

must forever rest. 7. Appeals for Aid .- The conclusion of the congress is that worthy Masons are entitled to relief from brethren and lodges wheresoever they may be found in need of relief, and that the brethren of lodges granting such aid are not entitled to demand reimbursement from the lodges in which they hold their membership, but that when a member of one lodge is relieved by another, and the financial situation of his lodge is such as to permit, common courtesy and duty alike demand that it should reimburse a poorer lodge relieving its members. Written or printed appeals for aid which do not secure the indorsement of the grand master of the jurisdiction from which they emanate should be dis-

countenanced. 8. Non-Affiliates. - The conclusion of the congress is, that every Mason ought to be a member of some regular lodge, attend its meetings and share its burdens.

clusion of the congress that absolute com-petency to conform literally to all the requirements of the ceremonies of the several degrees of ancient craft Masonry fulfills the requirements of physical perfection in a candidate.

10. Inspection of Lodge Charters .- It is the conclusion of the congress that a visitor to a lodge has no right to demand an inspection of the lodge charter.

The foregoing conclusions have, of course, no binding effect upon the jurisdictions represented, but are simply the opinions of the congress as formulated on the subjects discussed.

It will be observed by reference to the grand secretary's report, that a very considerable number of lodge bylaws and amendments of bylaws were submitted to me during the year for approval. Attention was called by me last year, as had been frequently done by my predecessors, to want of due formality in the submission bylaws, but there has been no noticeable improvement. Probably there never will

DECISIONS.

Again I refrain from submitting to Grand Lodge any of my rulings during the past year. It does not occur to me that any of them have been of sufficient importance to go on record. In the majority of cases the points referred to me could and might have been disposed of by the district deputy grand masters. In a few instances masterly inactivity has been deliberately practiced by me, as the best remedy for difficulties in which my intervention was sought. A little time for reflection given to brethren who appear to be "spoiling for a fight" over practically nothing, instead of promptly coming down with an abrupt decision in favor of one and to the entire discomficure of the other will not infrequently result in the passing entirely

away of necessity for any deliverance. DISPENSATION. On March 29 last a dispensation was issued for a new lodge at Hanover, to be known as Hanover Lodge. The petition was indorsed by Saugeen Lodge, No. 187, of Walkerton, and recommended by the D.D.G.M. The new lodge will simply occupy territory formerly covered by a lodge of the same name at the same place, whose warrant was surrendered on Sept.

21, 1886. The grand master praises the work of the General Masonic Relief Association, as a defense against impostors. He also discusses the question of jurisdiction over candidates, which is not very clear in some grand lodges, and proceeds to speak of LODGE WORK,
