The Coming Road Motor—Striking Prophecy.

One of the most interesting addresses at the late meeting of the British Association was that given by Mr. N. P. Macdenald, on the future of motor cars. Mr. Macdonald believes that for short distances the electric car of the future will replace the old railway system, just as the steam underground railway in London has had to give place to the electric system, of which the "twopenny tube." which runs through the heart of the metropolis from Shepherd's Bush to the Bank, is a splendid

This change need not surprise the railways, for already on this continent electric railways have come to stay, though they have not yet been tried for very long distances. However, when we consider that as late as 1883 the editor of the leading engineering magazine in America expressed the conviction that electricity could never be profitably turned to account in propelling railway cars - even street railway cars - we need not be astonished to find many changes near future. We may even live to see the day when the trains on the Grand Trunk and C. P. R. lines running through this city may have their cars propelled by electricity obtained from harnessing the power that now runs to waste at Niagara Falls. On line with this idea is the prophecy of Sir Hiram Maxim, who the other day astonished old Londoners by foretelling the construction of an electric railway to Brighton, some 60 miles long, by which the traveler may leave Brighton at 10 o'clock and arrive in London half an

hour later. Mr. Macdonald had, however, but reached the beginning of his prophecy when he expressed his conviction that in the very near future the usefulness of the electric car would be vastly increased. The motor car, in his view. is to be the favorite means of transit in the future. It will, he says, be found to be more convenient, swifter, safer and handier, than either the electric train or electric street railway. Mr. Macdonald is no doubt quite right in at least a part of his statement of the merits of the motor car. It may be swifter and more convenient than either the street car or electric railway of today. But how Mr. Macdonald reaches the conclusion that it will be safer we confess to be puzzled to make out. We read of the perilous chances that were taken by the manipulators of the automobiles in the international race that took place in France and Germany last summer, and we can think of no road rules that would make the highways safe for either vehicular transit or pedestrians, if the new motors were to be let loose on them at the speed that Mr. Macdonald foreshadows. At present railways and their electric competitors have a clear course before them; but the motor car careers along the highway with a terrific speed, the dust raised oftentimes entirely enveloping the occupant and everything that is near him and his "fiery steed." The very outfit of the occupant of the automobile of today betokens the discomfort that he has to undergo in order to "enjoy" his ride. He wears a heavy coat, and he is compelled to guard his eyes with green goggles. On a hot day these discomforting precautions are such as would deter all but the most enthusiastic motor-men from

AERIAL NAVIGATION. M. Santos-Dumont is engaged in the laborious operation of fitting up the airship Santos-Dumont No. 6. His experiments at a height of 100 meters above the balloon park will be continued on Saturday and Sunday, if the atmospheric conditions are favorable. The committee of the Aero Club will meet at the balloon park to witness the attempt of Dumont to win the Grand Prix de l'Aero Club.

PERILOUS VOYAGE, Herr Kress (Austrian), inventor of an airship, started Thursday afternoon on yet another trial on the Tullneroacher reservoir. The result was disastrous. After going a certain distance, Herr Kress started his meter at full speed ahead, which caused the forward part of the flying machine to rise about 35 centimeters out of the water. On rising to this height the whole machine suddenly lost its equilibrium and swung over to the right This caused it to fill with water, and it sank like a stone. The water at this point is 15 meters deep. Herr Kress, who was alone, was carried down with the ship, but, thanks to the life-preserver he wore, he came to the surface, and was able to grasp the poles which the officer and engineman, who were witnesses of the accident held out to him.
