WARD FOREMEN ASK INCREASE.

Think They Work Too Hard for the Money They Receive.

Board of Works Again Deals With Stanley Street Matter--An Isolation Hospital.

The board of works held their regular meeting last night. The mayor and Ald. Gerry were unavoidably absent. No special business was transacted.

A deputation of Stanley street residents waited on the board to attempt to prevent the street railway from laying a switch or double-track on Stanley street. They contended that the street would be seriously injured in either case. The cars would then run so close to the sidewalk that when two cars met on the switch the street would be practically blocked. If the railway company were to lay a switch they should run on the belt line both ways, and the deputation claimed that the bylaws would force them to do it. The matter was laid over until the next meeting of the committee, when Mr. Carr will be requested to attend. The city clerk's opinion will be in the meantime be obtained.

Mr. McLean, a member of the deputation, stated that if the committee met next Friday they should be in a position to deal with a proposition from the Grand Trunk Railway, who intend to double-track their road from the first Thames bridge to Komoka, and to raise the grade to Sifton's cut. He said the road also intended to build a new bridge over the second crossing, and that the proposition would materially affect the street railway question.

The city ward foremen wrote the committee, asking for an increase in wages. They thought that for the hours they worked they did not receive sufficient remuneration, and asked that their wages be increased to \$2 a day. In consequence of receiving an increase they were prepared to allow the city the use of their lots. No action was taken in the matter.

In regard to a memo from the council re the laying of curbing, Ald. Jolly moved that persons wanting curbing should be charged with the cost of the frontage, with the exception of the cross-street intersections. Carried.
A memo regarding removal of the snow from sidewalks was again laid over.

Mrs. Clements was allowed \$15 for damages received by falling on a sidewalk.

The petition against a tar macadam pavement on Talbot street was placed in the assessment commissioner's hands.

A Valuable Addition to the Thriving Congregations and to the Presbytery.

The Presbytery of London met at Springfield yesterday at 2:30, and was duly constituted. Rev. Dr. Johnston, moderator, presiding. There were present: Messrs. Clark, Drummond, Klippen, McCrear, Stevens, and Mr. Murray and Mr. Mitchell, elders. Rev. Mr. Klippen conducted public worship, his text being I. Corinthians, xiii. 13: "Now abideth faith, hope, love, but the greatest of these is love."

After the sermon, Mr. Rae was duly inducted pastor of the charge of the congregations of Aylmer and Springfield.

Mr. Clark, London, then, by appointment of presbytery, addressed the newly-inducted pastor, as to his various duties as a preacher, as a pastor, and as a member of the presbytery.

Dr. McCrear, Westminister, addressed the people, congratulating them on the able man they had obtained. He was a good preacher, able on the platform, and experienced in the church's work. He warned them against expecting a perfect man would be very lonely. He asked for fair play, and that they should see to it that the pews are filled.

In the evening a reception was held in the church at Aylmer. The ladies furnished a bountiful repast in the basement, after which a meeting was held in the church, at which Mr. Drummond, who has acted as moderator during the vacancy, presided. Addresses were delivered by Dr. McCrear, Westminister; Dr. Johnston, and Mr. W. J. Clark, of London; Mr. Vining, Baptist minister in Aylmer; Mr. McDonald, Baptist minister at Springfield; and the people of Aylmer and Toronto cordially welcomed Rev. Mr. Rae on behalf of the town of Aylmer.

Mr. McAllister, the minister of the Methodist Church, Aylmer, was also present, but was unable to remain and deliver an address of welcome.

Mr. Rae briefly and feelingly responded to all the kind words of welcome.

The choir, of the aid of one or two friends, gave very suitable musical selections.

The church was filled to the doors, and the outlook of the Presbyterian congregations in Aylmer and Springfield is brighter than it has ever been.

His specialty is Sabbath school work, and he has done good work in that branch of Christian activity. He has also been honored by his brethren as moderator of the Presbytery of Toronto and is a distinct addition to the town of Aylmer, a most thriving and ambitious burgh.

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
