the most feasible course would be to work under the last conditions. The cost of constructing a transmission line to Berlin would be in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000, and according to a Government engineer's figures power could be distributed at about \$15 per horse power for 24 hours. Mr. Snider thought that a good plan to expedite matters would be for the meeting to appoint a committee of five, group the municipalities and to determine the best means to distribute the power to these municipali ties. In order to do this a small fund to be substituted by the various councils should be placed at the disposal of the committee. The union of the municipalities is an absolute necessity if the best results are to be achiev ed in securing the lowest possible rates for electrical power from Niagara, In concluding his address, Mr. Snider read several communications from President Ellis, of the Toronto Board of Trade, and Mr. Wilson, Mayor Urquhart's secretary, expressing their regret at their inability to be present. A motion was moved by Mayor Maxwell, St. Thomas, seconded

Mayor Hamilton, of Guelph, that it is to the interests of the municipalities that a united effort be made to develop Niagara power under the Niagara power act. The resolution was carried unanimously.
