MR. W. W. GAMMAGE NAMED CHAIRMAN

Advisory Board for Industrial Education Met for Organization.

At the inaugural meeting of the advisory board for industrial education in London, held Monday night in the city hall, Mr. W. W. Gammage was chosen chairman. His was the only name submitted.

A general discussion followed on the question of operation, and it was decided to name a special committee, comprising Gammage, M. F. Irwin and P. E. Leonard to inquire fully into the matter of methods, equipment, etc., and report back to the general committee at the earliest possible convenience.

The suggestion that a fee of 50 cents per pupil be charged met with much criticism, and although the majority were in favor of this charge, the idea was not popular with some members, and will meet with much opposition when the board of education take the matter up finally.

Mr. H. B. Beal, principal of the Colborne street school, was named principal of the industrial school. He has given the matter of industrial education a very close study, and is particularly well qualified to take charge of this important branch of the board's work.

Laurier Bares THAT ALLIANCE

Liberal Chief's Scathing Criticism of Mr. Borden's Coalition.

MR. MONK THE ACROBAT

What Were the Terms Upon Which Nationalist Leader Entered Imperial Administration, Sir Wilfrid Asks.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—During the debate on the speech from the throne today, the House sat up and leaned forward in eager expectancy when Sir Wilfrid Laurier passed on to the consideration of the naval policy. The Minister's benches were patently ill at ease, and Sir Wilfrid, composed, amid roars of laughter and applause, they made a sorry spectacle. He read the resolution, in which the House had unanimously concurred, calling for some naval action by the former government, and supplemented it with the reading, amid laughter, of Mr. Borden's resolution calling for the building of Dreadnoughts and a more advanced naval policy than that of the former administration. Mr. Borden had complained because the naval policy of Sir Wilfrid had been too autonomous and not enough imperial. The country had been vain for Mr. Borden's pronouncement of policy in the speech from the throne. The present Government, of course, would be a true-blue Tory Administration, and would be satisfied with sound imperialism as they understand imperialism.

Toronto's Voice.

"I could quote sentence after sentence, speech after speech," continued Sir Wilfrid, "but it will be sufficient for the present to recall the words of my honorable friend, the Prime Minister, spoken at Toronto, when he declared that the voice of Toronto should be the voice of Canada. Well, we know the voice of Toronto in regard to the navy. The voice of Toronto has always been that the navy bill which was introduced was not sufficiently imperialistic and was too much autonomous. That is the only criticism that was ever made. And, sir, on the very next day, the 22nd of September, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain himself, the apostle of imperialism, cabled his congratulations and his blessings to my honorable friend, stating that he was in the ranks, until the dawn of the day he had long been looking for, and that he hoped soon to see the realization of his imperialistic dream."

"So under the circumstances, therefore, there is perhaps no occasion to ask what is the character of this Administration in saying, with a full sense of responsibility, that this is a true imperialist Administration. That is what my reason would tell me, but my eyes tell me a different story. (Laughter and applause.) When I look about I cannot see what is in the hearts of our honorable friends, that they have refused to tell us—but see before me a very composite galaxy. I see men sitting on the treasury benches opposite, one, two, three, perhaps four, upon which is the blessing of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, who would produce the same contortions as the sprinkling of holy water upon the head of Satan. (Renewed laughter and applause.) They cannot have come together without something extraordinary having taken place. This Government is like another Joseph. It wears a coat of many colors. (Heard, hear, and laughter.) And the other Joseph was betrayed by his brothers and sold into bondage. I have no rank in saying, with a full sense of responsibility, that the honorable gentlemen now on the treasury benches cannot be other than traitors to the cause of their brethren have been betrayed, and unless some of the electors, either

in Ontario or in Quebec, have been sold, and badly sold. (Cheers.)
