Rather than spend from \$15, 000 to \$25,000 on the Giles bridge, he would rebuild several of the old bridges, which were liable to go down at any time.

Councillor Laidlaw thought it was infair to put off those who wanted the bridge on the plea that the finances of the county would not allow it. Either throw out the project altogether, or award the contracts which had been favorably accepted.

New Tenders. Councillor Hardy wanted new tenders called for. Councillor McDonald said the bridge was likely to cost from \$18,000 to \$25,000. Present circumstances did not warrant building the

Councillor Switzer wanted a bridge that would be lasting. Councillors Mc-Taggart and Currie declared the bridge was necessary. Now there are nine miles of river without a bridge. Warden Buttery thought that the bridge ought to be proceeded with in fairness to all. Last year the council
