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effort to make itself a free people, seeking national development according to its own ideals, instead of sinking under Russian domination. The mission schools and colleges are gradually building up in those lands an educated middle class, thinking and working; and the strength and the future of a country lies in this class.

"One can recognize at a glance the difference between the ordinary native and the one who has been educated at one of the American mission colleges; his face, his eyes, his very walk, are all different. Several times in a small town or a village of central Anatolia I have distinguished an approaching figure as mission-taught, simply by his free walk contrasted with the shuffling step of the ordinary Oriental.

"Our Debt to the East.
"As Christianity began in Asia and spread to Europe and America, so in the great missionary movement of recent times we see the reflex sweep of the wave. The West has not been content to receive, it has been resolved to give back to the East. This modern crusade is as heroic as, and a million times wiser than, the Crusades of the Middle Ages. It does not narrow its aim to liberating the holy places from the Moslem; it does not try to achieve its aim by battle and the slaughter of opponents; it seeks to liberate both Moslem and Christian from the bondage of ignorance and sloth. It has done much already, and it has a far greater future before it.

"In seeking to influence the East, and to repay a debt to the East, it is in the way to regenerate not merely the East, but also the West. The Christian religion lost something in narrowing itself to the West. It must regain what it lost before it can touch the heart of Asia; and in restoring this, it revivifies itself in Europe.

"Thus the history of the Levant lands begins from religion and leads us back to religion, though a wide compass round be fetched. So the ancient poet found that the beginning and the end alike were in the supreme god Zeus. The will of God is the soul of history.

The Zionist Movement.

"There is another cause to which many look for the revivification of Palestine at least, and that is the Zionist movement and the return of the Jews to their original home.

"But this is for all a narrow sectarian movement. It does not seek to regenerate the land through the people; it aims at replacing the people by a new and an exclusive race. It is impossible for me, with the view of history that I hold, to believe that the Bible lands can ever revive again through a narrow separatist movement. That they will revive, and be prosperous, populous, and happy, I do not doubt.

"Whether they will again become great in the sense of being more the centre and motive-power of the world's history, as they once were, must be left to the future to show. No man dare prophesy or anticipate the remote future," concludes Sir William.

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found to be unfit to drink, and we have had to carry all the water we require from a neighboring well. The gas, electric light and telephone we found to be mere chimeras, figures of most fertile imagination. There were not more than twenty-five settlers on the place, and many of them were dissatisfied, as everything was quite the opposite of what had been represented in England.

Some of us thought we would give it a trial, others declined to start work and left before the week was out. Those who remained got their land in crop as best they could. The instructors who were supposed to visit each settler every day only visited them as the spirit moved them, and some of us rarely saw them more than once a week, often not even that. We put in the crops as we were told, and then discovered that they were put in about three weeks too late, and the result is some of us have practically no crops at all.

We soon discovered that the land was thoroughly run down, and that it would take several years of very heavy and expensive manuring to bring it up to the richness it was stated to possess. We also found it was full of weeds, and all summer long it has been a continuous fight against them. Far from being well drained, it has been waterlogged for weeks at a time, and until it is fully drained no profitable crops will ever be

Railroads, Agriculture and Strategic Location are Making

STUDY THE RAILWAY
SITUATION AT CANORA

Canora is on the main line of the Canadian Northern Railway.

Canora is the junction and terminal point of the Canadian Northern Railway's Rosburn line.

Canora is on the important new Canadian Northern Railway line now being constructed running north from Canora to Hudson Bay Junction.

Canora is on the new Canadian Northern Railway line to be built south to Maryfield, Sask., connecting the Hudson Bay Railway with Southern Saskatchewan.

Canora is also at present the northern terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific line from Regina to Canora. This company has already surveyed a line north from Canora, which line will connect with the Hudson Bay Railway.

Charter has also been issued to the Saskatchewan Central Railway Co. for a line running from North Portal to Hudson Bay Junction, and this charter also provides that this line shall pass through Canora.

This makes two and probably three short and direct connections with the Hudson Bay Railway, and these added to Canora's present radiating railway lines will make Canora an important distributing centre for goods coming to Canada via the Hudson Bay route.

In addition, Canora is situated in the heart of one of the most densely populated and most productive areas in Saskatchewan. From this point last year over 1,200,000 bushels of grain were shipped, and this year shipments are estimated to exceed 1,600,000 bushels.

The production of the Canora district will steadily increase owing to the rapid colonization of this territory.

Increase in the settlement of the surrounding country will also steadily augment the population in the town. Government statistics show that almost 21,000 homesteads have been taken up within a radius of 40 miles of Canora.

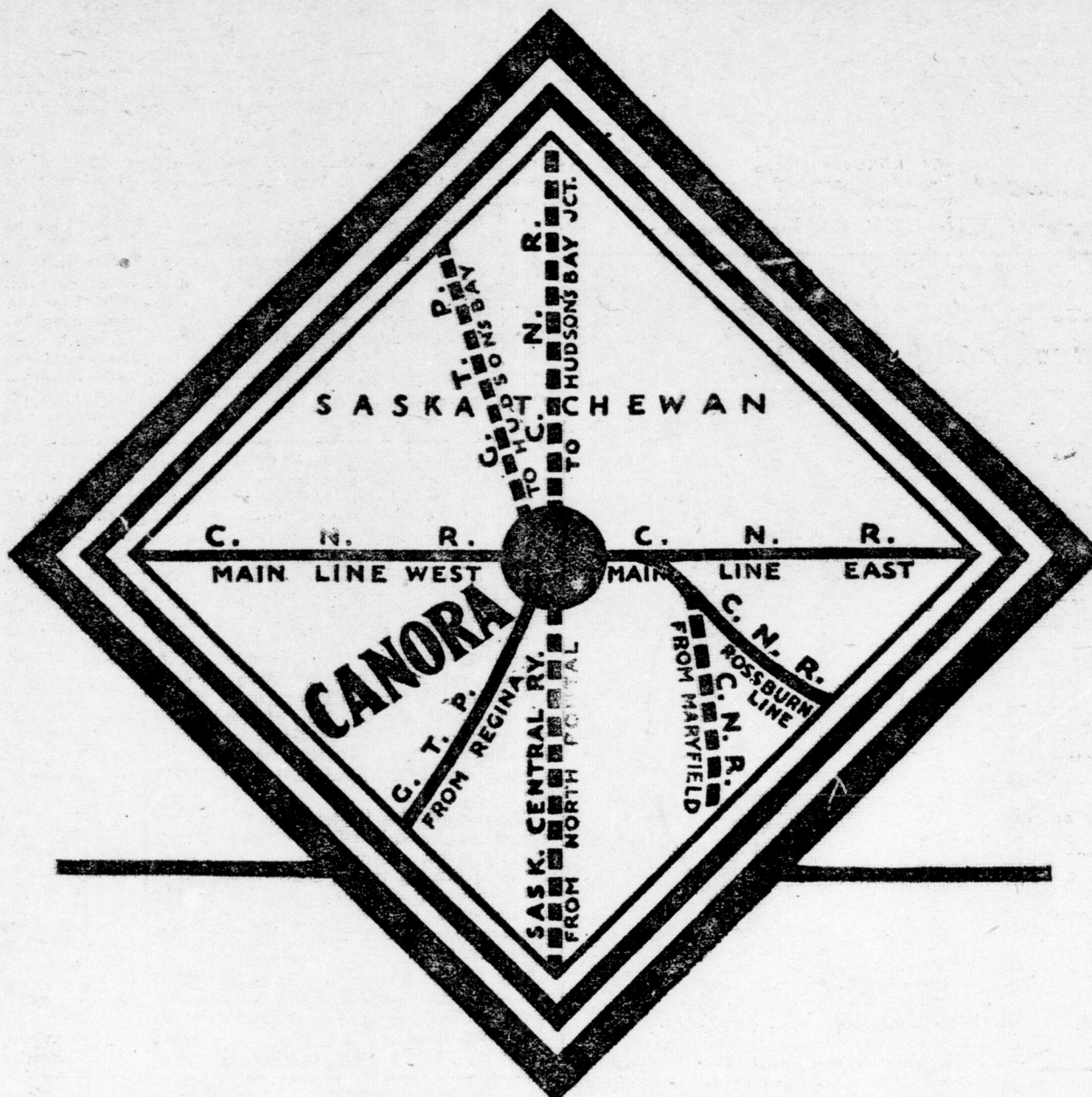

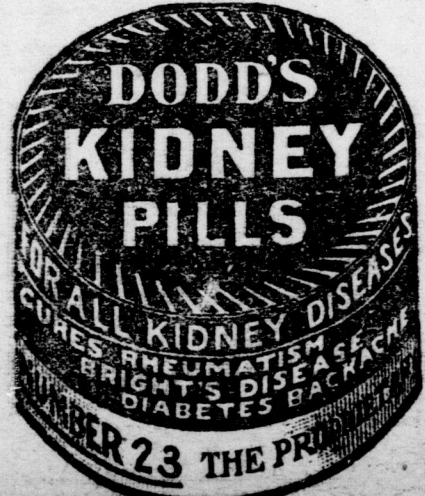

Redress for Others.
To one who remains and to those who left in September no redress has been



grown on it. As the season advanced we found that the sales organization was not in existence, that no markets other than the existing factory had been found for us, and that we had to sell our produce to the factory at prices which did not pay the cost of labor.

A Lot of "Poor Managers."

Without deducting anything for seed or labor, few, if any, of us will make \$150 this year, and yet the company cannot see that we have any cause to complain, though they stated in their literature, "Anyone is a poor manager who does not make \$150 off ten acres." It was stated in England that markets had been found for us, and that all we would have to do would be to grow the stuff, harvest it, and the sales organization would do the rest.

Believing that markets had been found, many of us put in half an acre of melons and one acre of cucumbers, and afterwards, when asking what was to be done with the crops, we were informed that "no markets had been found for them, as the company did not intend to handle anything except in carload lots." The local market is so small that half a ton of fruit would glut it for a month, and the result is that these crops are lying rotting on the ground. The company cannot see we have any cause of complaint, or that they are morally responsible for causing the ruin of the settlers. Time after time they have been asked to do something for us, but they have treated us with contempt. They have fulfilled none of the promises made in England, and they deny having made certain statements to intending purchasers.

Fifty settlers who came out there now remain actually living in the place, ten of these six at least are making preparations to go to pasture now. Something must be very far wrong if some out of fifty Britishers drawn from every class of society cannot stick it and make good. We believe we have been defrauded, and we feel that the Government of Ontario is responsible, in that it allowed the company to issue pamphlets representing that the Government was giving the scheme its support. Had it not been for that fact the majority of the settlers would never have given the scheme a moment's consideration, and I have it from the lips of one of the English direc-

tors that he would never have given one of ours to be hand-overed by one man in a full order, especially on food land like Jeannette, and the enemy prevailed. In some cases a mower was utilized as a "dernier resort"; in others the plow was called into requisition. This was the first blow to our hopes of reaping a good reward for our labors. Beets for the factory began to be harvested and it was soon found that to harvest them and to pay for the cartage would leave us out of pocket. Likewise with beans. Tomatoes were planted too late and the market has been overhauled, thus offering another cause of disappointment.

LATER.

Some Had Deposits Returned.

The alluring picture of Jeannette as drawn by the company representative, who described it as his home, whereas we now know he never set foot in it until July, 1912, the inducements held out by their literature prevailed upon about fifty families, drawn from every class of British society, to throw up their occupations in the old country and try their fortunes in Jeannette. Of these about 25 came, saw and departed, the company returning to them their deposit of \$500. The remainder decided to give it a trial. They followed out to the letter the instructions given; they in many cases got up at daybreak to battle with the weeds only retiring from the fields when it was too dark to see the enemy. Four acres

When I say that off 2½ acres of tomatoes I have had a gross return of \$9 and that I am charged by the company for tomato plants \$16.25, you will readily see that I have every reason to be disheartened over that. When these things became evident the remaining 25 settlers began to wonder what was to become of them during the winter. It was obvious they would not have one cent profit from their ten acres and several for a time went out harping on the shoulders of their neighbors. Then they got employment for the winter. Some in shops, some in factories, while others took farms at some distance. A few of us, about eight in number, remained and took out our crops. Of these one has now gone, the company having, it is understood, returned him his deposit of \$500, and given him all his crop, which amounted to about \$120, without charging him for seed or labor. Two others are to get their \$500 returned in about eight weeks and four the company are including to stay by undertaking to give them rent free, in some cases for two years, about 50 acres, to heavily manure about five acres of this for garden truck, to plow and seed the land next spring. In fact in order to keep four people on the property they are willing to promise anything.
