Advantage of Turks.

The occupation by the Turkish troops of the Tabriz district in northern Persia derives its strategic importance from the fact that it carries with it Turkish control of highways and railroads leading to the Russian frontier. These roads, which provide the only practicable routes through Persia, are owned and managed by either the Russian Government or Russian companies which have obtained concessions from

The occupation of Tabriz by the Turks vas accomplished only after a hard fight, in which artillery was operated, according to information which has reached the Persian legation here. Hassan Ali Khan Kaffary, first secretary of the legation, said that the Russian garrison at Tabriz had offered stubborn resistance but had been compelled to retire, owing to the overwhelming numerical superiority of the Turkish


