

NEW ZEPPELIN READY FOR NORTH SEA WORK

Makes Successful Trial Trip
From Its Base At Friedrichshaven.

GENEVA (Via Paris), Jan. 14.—A new Zeppelin airship left Friedrichshaven yesterday on a trial flight over an hour. After skirting Lake Constance, the airship disappeared over the grand duchy of Baden, and later returned safely to its shed. Prior to making the trip a German aeroplane made a scouting tour in order to prevent a surprise by French aircraft.

It is reported that the new Zeppelin will depart shortly for service on the North Sea.

RUSSIANS WORKING UNDER A NEW PLAN

Evacuate Certain Points To
Rearrange Their
Forces.

TURK GAINS IN PERSIA

Obtain Control of Highways
and Railways Leading
to Russia.

(Canadian Press.)
PETROGRAD, Jan. 14.—The official report from the Caucasus army issued tonight, follows:

"To avoid any false understanding of our operations in Azerbaijan during the last few days the general staff of the army of the Caucasus has deemed it advisable to issue the following statement:

"From the beginning of the decisive action in the principal region of this region of war it has been necessary to regroup our troops. In accordance with this we proceeded in Azerbaijan to concentrate our troops at certain points, necessitating the evacuation of certain points we had occupied previously."

"This re-arrangement of our forces was not under pressure of the enemy but in accordance with a specially devised plan. During this operation no important position was lost, except an engagement which our advance guards had near Miankundu. Thus we did not evacuate Azerbaijan, but adopted changes in position answering better the new developments."

Advantage of Turks.
The occupation by the Turkish troops of the Tabriz district in northern Persia derives its strategic importance from the fact that it carries with it Turkish control of highways and railways leading to the Russian frontier. These roads, which provide the only practicable routes through Persia, are owned and managed by either the Russian Government or Russian companies which have obtained concessions from Persia.

The occupation of Tabriz by the Turks was accomplished only after a hard fight, in which artillery was operated, according to information which has reached the Persian legation here. Hassan Ali Khan Kaffary, first secretary of the legation, said that the Russian garrison at Tabriz had offered stubborn resistance but had been compelled to retire, owing to the overwhelming numerical superiority of the Turkish forces.

Russian troops had been garrisoned in Northern Persia since the revolution in that country in 1906-07, under agreement with England, for a time controlling the southern portion of the country.

Long Turkish Trip.
The Turkish forces which occupied Tabriz came from Erzerum, covering a hundred miles over a circuitous route, through a difficult mountainous territory.

The Russian Government continues to protest against Turkey's violation of Persian neutrality, and intimates that Persian officials have not taken sufficiently energetic measures to prevent this violation.

TURKISH STATEMENT.
AMSTERDAM, Holland, Jan. 14.—via London.—There has been received here an official communication given out at Constantinople by the Turkish authorities as follows:

"Assisted by Persian troops our army is steadily advancing in the Azerbaijan province, Persia, in order to deliver the country from the Russian yoke."

"We have had further notable successes, occupying advanced positions of the Russians in the vicinity of Tabriz."

"A number of tribesmen of the British army of occupation in Egypt have surrendered to our vanguard."

WOULD PUT BULLET THROUGH WIFE'S HEAD

Jesse Woods Is In the Sarnia Jail On a Serious Charge.

FLORENCE, Jan. 14.—For threatening to put a bullet through his wife's head, Jesse Woods, a Euphem Township farmer, was taken to Sarnia jail today by Constable J. Hanks, after appearing before G. A. Annett, J. P.

Woods chased Mrs. Woods from the home with the threat, and she ran to a neighbor's, Mr. Crowell, for refuge, and he followed so close that she became so frightened that she again took the woman in and kept her safe until a trial could be arranged for, which was done as speedily as possible.

Woods has not maintained his family property. It consists of seven small children, two of whom were able to testify against Mr. Annett. The woman was much affected as the children told a pitiful story, in a straightforward way.

A NEW PRESIDENT IN MEXICO.
EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 14.—Official confirmation was received here today of the appointment as provisional president by the Villa-Zapata convention of Eulalio Gutierrez. President Gutierrez was thus named to complete the original Diaz term, which would end in December, 1915.

MAN'S FULL TIME TAKEN IN REGISTERING ALIENS

Toronto Finds Judge Coatsworth Must Be Relieved.

TORONTO, Jan. 14.—A. J. Russell Snow has been appointed registrar of aliens by the Dominion Government, to succeed His Honor Judge Coatsworth. His honor communicated with the Minister of Justice some time ago and asked to have a successor appointed, as the work had become so great he could not attend to his duties on the bench and look after the registration as well. The work of registration practically takes up all of one man's time.

GERMAN BARON HELD

Vancouver Officers Doubt Story of Hostility to Kaiser.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 14.—Baron Carl Von Mackensen, former officer in the famous Prussian Death's Head Hussars, and a nephew of the famous Gen. Von Mackensen, who is now leading the German forces in Russian Poland, together with Dr. Otto Redlich, a German reservist, were all arrested today after they had lodged in the New Westminster jail. It is expected that they will be detained until the end of the war.

Von Mackensen, who is a young, delicate-looking fellow, and Dr. Redlich were arrested a couple of weeks ago by the local provincial authorities, and later released after they had made explanations. Von Mackensen at that time showed a copy of a letter he had sent to the German consul at Seattle, refusing to obey the summons to return to the colors, and stated that before war was declared he had applied for naturalization as a British subject. Today the military authorities decided to rearrest and detain the men.

ORDER OF HOME CIRCLES MUST STICK TO CHARTER

Appellate Court Sustains Judgment of Chief Justice R. M. Meredith.

TORONTO, Jan. 14.—The first judgment rendered by the newly constituted appellate court was read by Mr. Justice Hodgins at Osgoode Hall this morning, and sustained the judgment of Chief Justice R. M. Meredith in the case of George Grainger vs. the Order of Canadian Home Circles.

Under the charter of this society members are entitled to receive half the amount of their policies upon attaining the age of 70, and the trial judge held, and the appellate division agreed, that in making a rule postponing this date, the society was amending not its rules, but its charter, which is ultra vires of its powers.

BUSINESS RESTORED THROUGHOUT RUSSIA

Railway Traffic Is Back To Nearly Normal—Little Unemployment.

(Canadian Press.)
PETROGRAD, Jan. 14.—The following official statement was given out here tonight:

"The minister of finance declares that the completion of mobilization has made possible the gradual restoration of freight traffic on the railroads of the country. The traffic in November, 1914, was only 23 per cent lower than that of November, 1913.

"The postponement of the payment of debts which had reached maturity and the various financial restrictions imposed caused considerable commercial difficulties during the first weeks of the war. The situation, however, soon became better and the unfavorable effect of the war upon commerce is becoming less and less, thanks to the measures for aiding credit and restoring merchandise traffic on the railroads.

"Unemployment in the various industries is not noticeable except in regions where the war is in progress. Except in the small portion of Russian territory occupied by the enemy industrial activity shows no important slackening.

"This comparatively favorable showing is due in the first place to the greater productivity of the labor following the cessation of the sale of spirits. Productivity has increased from 30 to 50 per cent and this, to a large extent makes up for the shortage of labor consequent upon the calling of the workers to the colors."

THREE DROWNED

Women and Two Children in Sleigh Go Through Ice.

VANKLEEK HILL, Ont., Jan. 14.—Mrs. Vinette and child and a little child, the daughter of Mrs. Cousineau, all of St. Thomas D'Alfred, were drowned in the Ottawa River last night.

They were driving across the river in a sleigh, in which were nine adults and two children, when the team went through the ice and all were thrown into the water. The two children were left with Mrs. Vinette. The other members of the party were saved. The bodies of Mrs. Vinette and the Cousineau child have been recovered, and search parties are looking for the other child. The children were about two months old.
