My Dear Friend,-No doubt you have thought me very unkind in not writing to you before, and I guess you think. out of sight out of mind, but such is not the case with me, as I often think of the good times we had while I were with you, and I hope before long to have similar good times.

We are having fairly nice times here. and one would hardly know we were at war, but for seeing trainloads of wounded come in, and a guard we do every day, for our boys parade the streets just as if we were in Canada, but they won't do that when we get up the line, which, by the way, I hear we are going to do the end of this month. The sooner the better, for we shall take our turn in the trenches we are only Army Service Corp by name, because we do our wards just like the regular army. From that I have seen, and by "boys" I have spoken to from the trenches, give this war, over in June or July, for the "Huns" cannot last much longer, as

### Can London Have Both the Fair and Big Khaki Camp?

This Question Will Have To Be Debated As It Appears That Guelph and Goderich Are Both Anxious To Secure the Soldiers.

Two other places in Western Ontario are aggressively conducting a lobby at Ottawa in the hope of securing the concentration camp for this district. Guelph is ready to offer considerable inducements to secure the camp, and Goderich is also making every effort to have the military forces enlisted in this district taken to the lake shore for the summer at least.

While Landon's chances of retain ing and adding to the force now stationed here are good, there is a probability that a conflict of opinion will arise over the question of hold. ing the Western Fair. Recently The Advertiser stated that the genera opinion was that the fair should be held but that was before it was realized that the holding of the exhibition this year might conflict with the forming of a concentration camp in the city.
