TWO INJURED WHEN AUTOS CRASH INTO BICYCLES ON STREET

Richard Best in Hospital and Perrin Gorman Home.

POLICE INVESTIGATING

Claimed That Neither Car Was Going Fast When Accidents Happened.

Perrin Gorman, aged 15, of 29 Portridge street, was struck by an auto driven by Fred Cooper of 354 Wellington street at the corner of Waterloo street and Queen's avenue last evening, and painfully but not seriously hurt. His bicycle was wrecked.

The lad was riding along beside the auto, and, according to Cooper, he did not know the boy was there, and started to turn down Queen's avenue. Just at the same moment young Gorman tried to ride ahead of the car, with the result that he was struck. Cooper was not going fast, and as soon as he saw that a collision could not be avoided jammed on his brakes and turned the opposite way. The rear wheels skidded with such force as to cause one tire to burst.

Young Gorman was hurled to the side of the road and badly shaken up and cut and bruised about the face. He was carried into the office of Dr. C. L. Campbell and later was taken home by Cooper.

W. H. Couchman of 442 Waterloo street, who was standing at the corner and saw the accident, said Cooper held out his hand to indicate he was going to make the turn, but Gorman apparently did not see him.

Police Sgt. Lucas, who came along, is making a report on the case.

Another very similar accident occurred at the corner of Dundas and Ridout street about the same time.

Richard D. Best, aged 39, of 503 Nelson street, while riding his bicycle was struck by an auto driven by R. Smith of 167 Duchess avenue. He was rushed to Victoria Hospital, where it was found that he was badly shaken up and bruised and had his leg injured. The police are making an investigation into this accident also. It was stated that Mr. Smith's car was going slowly when Best was struck.

Desires a Correction.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

The account of the accident between the auto of Mr. J. H. Herrick of Avon and the horse and buggy of Mrs. William Lambden of Delmar and Mr. J. W. Forbes of Flint, Michigan, in Brownsville, near some corrections.

From the account, the responsibility of the accident falls on the occupants of the buggy, when it states that they "took the wrong side of the road. It is said." Mrs. Lambden was not driving, but Mr. Forbes of Flint, and had followed the milk wagon for a mile, and had at two or three times tried to pass, but were unable to, as the driver of the wagon did not give them an opportunity, but when nearing Brownsville they were unable to see the approaching car from the opposite direction, and as the wagon turned out to the right side to meet the auto, Mr. J. W. Forbes turned out to pass the wagon on the proper side, which is the left, and as he drove from behind the wagon the car and buggy collided.

The horse was quite badly bruised and scratched and was thrown over the front of the car, the front mudguard of which had to be removed. The horse was able to travel home and is able to travel today. Mrs. Lambden was thrown from the buggy and received slight bruises, besides a nervous shock. Mr. Forbes had his arm badly sprained, and both had to be attended by a physician. Mrs. Lambden has been convalescing from a serious illness of several weeks in the Tillsonburg Hospital. Mr. and Mrs. Herrick were unhurt. The collision was purely accidental, and no blame for it has been attached to either party.
