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HIGH W BRIGQUETTES PUT ON MARKET

Experiment At Bienfai, Sask., Being Watched With Much Interest.

WINNIPEG, July 11.—Lignite briquettes from the big plant at Bienfai, Sask., will likely be put on the market during July, according to J. M. Leamy, Manitoba power commissioner and a member of the lignite utilization board. Most of the machinery has been installed, but as the lignite briquette process is an entirely new process, everything will be thoroughly tried out before the product is placed upon the market.

A meeting of the board to determine distribution methods and the price of the briquettes will be held shortly. The probable price is \$11 per ton. This is a little higher than was originally estimated, due to the increased cost of machinery, materials and labor.

The United States Government is closely watching the experiment at Bienfai, according to recent dispatches. The department of the interior is contemplating establishing similar plants in the lignite areas of the United States, but has held off to ascertain with what success the Canadian experiment meets.

The plant has been erected as a result of the joint efforts of the Dominion, Manitoba and Saskatchewan Governments. The Federal Government has borne half the cost, and the Manitoba and Saskatchewan Governments the other half.

Canada's Fur Yield Worth \$21,197,372 Of the Total Ontario Pelts Were Valued At \$6,414,917.

The census of fur furs for the season 1919-20, conducted by the Canadian Bureau of Statistics, shows the total value of pelts of fur-bearing animals taken in Canada in that season to be \$21,197,372. To this total Ontario contributed \$6,414,917; Quebec, \$4,971,110; Manitoba, \$3,130,627; Saskatchewan, \$2,528,731; and British Columbia, \$2,132,007.

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HAIR AND OATS ARE SCARCE IN CITY

Farmers Too Busy Harvesting To Bring Supplies To Market.

The local hay and oats market will reach a near-famine condition this week unless a change is made very soon. The farmers have all been so busy cutting their grain that practically none of these two products are being brought in for sale. The price of new hay was quoted today at \$10 to \$15, an advance from \$14 and \$16 a ton; while old hay is selling at \$17 to \$19, an advance from \$16 to \$19 a ton. Oats are retailing at \$15 and \$17 per cwt and at \$3c per bushel.

A few red cherries were sold at \$10 to \$15 wholesale and \$175 retail for a quart basket, and blackberries were sold at \$175 to \$190 for a quart basket. This week will probably see the last of this fruit.

A shipment of live hogs was made this morning at prices ranging from \$10 to \$10.50 per cwt.

Three or four crates of blackberries made an appearance at 15c a quart retail. Thursday and Friday, however, he another big day for raspberries.
