TWO-THIRD VOTE WOULD KILL BILL

Quebec Residents Want
Amendment Made To
Church Union Bill.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Quebec, Feb. 17.—In the course of the first volleys in favor of the bill of the United Church, fired on behalf of the union by Aime Geoffrion, K.C., at the meeting of the private bills committee this morning, the matter of an amendment to provide that a congregation needed a two-thirds vote to enter the United Church was raised by Premier Taschereau.

The premier said he had received many letters urging that the simple majority of a congregation, provided for by the federal house, and repeated in the present bill, be amended to provide for a two-thirds vote. Mr. Geoffrion made it clear that amendments of a radical nature would be equivalent to killing the bill, since in some cases the promoters would retire it and come back next year. His contention was that Ottawa had united the churches, and that it was only in certain matters that supplementary legislation was needed. Perhaps in some cases this supplementary legislation was not needed, but it was well to remove

Paris Cheers As Canadian In Canoe Leaps Into Seine

Paris, Feb. 17.—George Smyth, a Canadian canoeist, bearing his canoe with him in his descent, jumped off the bridge of the Invalides into the river Seine today, and although the craft shipped considerable water, he succeeded in pulling it out, righting it, and paddling it to shore to the accompaniment of cheers from a big throng.

The Seine was high from continued rains, making the distance from the doubts.

THREE RATEPAYERS FREED IN HAMILTON TAX SCANDAL

Hamilton, Feb. 17.—Three ratepayers charged with conspiracy in connection with the city tax scandal, were acquitted when they appeared in county criminal court today. They were Dr. Stanley Perkins, David Sutton and Albert Wenham.

At the conclusion of the crown's evidence, counsel for the accused submitted that no case had been made and the judge, agreeing, discharged the three men without hearing defence testimony.

OFFICER IS SENT TO PROBE CLAIMS

Criminal Inspector To Investigate Certain Oil Wells in Texas.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—Inspector Hammond of the department of criminal investigation, Ontario provincial police, is going to Texas to make an independent investigation into certain oil wells there.

His trip will be by arrangement with the attorney-general, but at the expense of certain parties whose sales of oil stock, made in the county of Middlesex and other places in Ontario, have been under review by the department.

Ontario farmers are said to have invested \$400,000, and some of them now claim that their stock is not of great value, or at least that the wells in Texas have not oil in the quantities represented.

KLAN OATH TAKEN BY TWO HUNDRED

Secret Order Believed To Be Making Strides Despite Opposition.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—More than 200 were initiated last night into the Ku Klux Klan of Canada at the fourth ceremony of its kind to be held in Toronto, it is reported today. The grand klезде, who is said to be a wealthy Montrealer, came here to conduct the affair. It is stated that the order as instituted here is strongly imperialistic in its aims.

Another report is to the effect that two men who came here from the United States and registered the Ku Klux Klan under the partnership act were unable to show satisfactory credentials, and after failing to get the support of the Orange order, have left the city.

Hon. Lincoln Goldie, provincial secretary, announced today that representatives of the Klan had made application for a charter, but this had been refused.
