

Empress of India From Orient

Typhoons Made the Early Part of the Voyage Decidedly Interesting.

Humboldt Brings News of Oil Discoveries on the Alaskan Coast.

R. M. S. Empress of India arrived from the Orient port yesterday morning, about one day behind time, owing to bad weather encountered along the coast north of Shanghai.

The officers of the India had a good chance to see the wrecked Russian cruiser, which after the Japanese had quite failed with her, and she had put into Shanghai harbor to escape further attacks.

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Hero of the Hold Up Was Judge N. Bole

When Conductor Ward of the C. P. "Every man in the car stepped to the judge's side," he said. "We can give those fellows a surprise if they try to do us any harm."

"The judge handled his men like a general. Everything moveable was piled against the doors and windows, and the robbers were unable to get in."

"The lights in the corridors were left lighted, throwing a brilliant illumination over the very spots where the robbers would be expected to appear."

"The Pullman was darkened and brightly illuminated corridors presented an eerie appearance."

"After the train resumed its journey to Vancouver the passengers in the Pullman expressed their appreciation not only of the judge's heroism but also of the other passengers' conduct."
