

MASHERS AND MASHERS.

COMPLAINT AGAINST THE YOUNG PEOPLE WHO DO YONGE STREET.

Meeting of the City Council—Constructing Sewers in Winter—Examining New Industries—Those Everlasting Claims—The Local Improvement System.

Nearly all the aldermen were in their place last night. The mayor presided. Benjamin Ewing petitioned for compensation for injuries sustained by his wife in falling on an icy sidewalk.

A petition was received from the police force for a grant towards their superannuation fund.

A communication was read from Mulock, Tilt & McArthur, solicitors for Thos. Maclean, threatening proceedings against the city on account of loss occasioned by him in consequence of the obstruction of the sewer on Catherine street.

Petitions were received from J. Phillips and others for a cedar block roadway on Finchard place, between Grange road and Anderson, and from H. S. Mars and others for a block pavement on Beverley street between Queen street and College street.

The consumers' gas company wrote that it had been supplying 16 candle power gas for some time, notwithstanding statements to the contrary in the press.

CONSTRUCTION OF SEWERS. Ald. How asked why the construction of some sewers was allowed to go on while work was forbidden on other sewers.

Ald. Taylor, in the absence of the chairman of the works committee, disapproved of the construction of brick sewers in winter but had no objection to tile sewers.

ALSO DISORDERLY Males and females by conduct of persons of both sexes on Yonge street Saturday and Sunday nights. He said it was simply disgraceful and that he was in course of construction.

THE MAYOR SAID he would consult his brother police commissioners on the question. A while ago policemen in plain clothes had done good work in suppressing these disorderly characters.

THE MAYOR PROMISED to report the case to the board of works.

EXEMPTING INDUSTRIES. A clause in the executive report recommended that an exemption of 20 per cent be allowed on the buildings, plant and machinery of any new industry commencing in the city, provided they comply with certain stated regulations and employ not less than 50 hands.

REVENUE LICENSE FEES. Ald. Bevin moved against the refund of \$80 paid by J. Leslie Main for three performance at Shafter's theatre.

THE SHAPES OF LECTURES, which do not come under the license by-law.

ALD. LOVE SAID they were of the same nature as Mr. Kennedy's who had a party.

ALD. BEVIN'S resolution, which was carried.

THE MARKETS AND HEALTH committee asked authority to have 500 bottles printed and posted throughout the city.

ALD. DOWNEY SAID the proclamation was more to remind the citizens of the necessity of vaccination and most of them would go to their own physicians.

ALD. BEVIN WITHDREW his amendment, and the clause passed.

ALD. FARLEY MOVED that Walter Briggs' claim, recommended for settlement at \$25, be referred back. He said new light had been thrown on the case and that Mr. Briggs was entitled to a greater amount than was proposed.

ALD. BOSTWICK ASKED Farley about his new light and spoke against his amendment, but it passed.

ALD. LOVE AND BOSTWICK then made an effort to have the claim of Mrs. H. Hooper referred back, but the council voted dead against them, probably on account of their opposition to the Briggs' case.

THE COUNCIL WAS IN committee for some time on the recommendations of the legislative committee, which have already appeared in this paper.

THE BOYS' HOME.

Annual Report—State of the Institution—A New Building Greatly Needed—The Managers.

The annual meeting of the boys' home was held yesterday afternoon. There was a large attendance of ladies, clergymen and prominent citizens, all of whom have the good work and welfare of the institution at heart.

The youngsters having sung a song of welcome, the manager, Mr. J. W. Macdonald, presented the annual report.

The report was read by the secretary, Mrs. Sutherland Taylor. There were 184 inmates at the commencement of 1911.

During the year 60 boys were admitted. There were never less than 98 boys in the home at any time.

There were 31 sent to situations, 14 had been adopted, 2 were sent to the hospital, 10 were sent to the reformatory.

The boys' apprentice fund amounts to \$774.08. There is \$798.93 to the credit of the building fund.

The board of management for the ensuing year was appointed as follows: President, J. W. Macdonald; Vice-President, Mrs. Sutherland Taylor.

After speeches from Dr. Potts and Senator Allan, Prof. Wilson offered a resolution referring to the inadequacy of the present building.

The motion was carried and the appeal to the citizens for aid to erect a new building.
