TWENTY-SEVEN MENBURNED

BY THE EXPLOSION OF AN OIL TANK DURING A FIRE. n Examining a Building For Latent Sparks a Workman Stuck His Candle Into the Oil-A Bire-Sergeant Burned to a Crisp-Many Others May Likely

PARIS, Feb. 11 .- A workingman upset amp at 10 o'clock this morning in Vilmorin Andrieux's seedstore in the Rue de Reueilly. The store caught fire, but firemen put out the flames before they reached any of the large receptacles of oil kept in the building. Afterwards the firemen went through the building to ascertain whether any sparks had been left. They carried safety lamps, but the workingmen who

A workman inadvertently struck a candle against a receptacle containing 600 litres of oil. An explosion followed, and 10 firemen and 17 workingmen were thrown to the floor and more or less burned. Fire Sergt. Bochat was killed instantly and his body was burned to a crisp. A fireman who stood beside him when the sx-plosion occurred was so badly burned that he died a few hours later. The eight other firemen and the 17 workingmen suffered severe injuries, which in several cases are likely to result in death.
